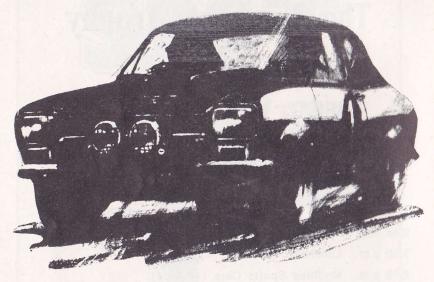

INGLISTON 1970

How on earth to review a Season at Ingliston—that is the problem! What phrase can describe the accumulated excitements of some 37 races? "The best Season's racing ever," was how Secretary of the Meeting, Alan Lamb, recently described 1970 at Ingliston. Perhaps that is the best description available too, since it not only conveys the excellence of the year's sport but lays an emphasis on the word "racing". For, not only have the races been fast and furious this year, they have also provided the cleanest year's sport seen at the Ingliston Circuit. There have been the inevitable incidents, of course, and "bumping and boring" does still go on, but we do seem to have seen an end to the worst offender of all, the stock car start. Certainly, the position in 1970 has been most encouraging—let us only hope that the racing can be made cleaner still (and safer) in 1971.

1970 has also put an end to the cry that "there are no thrills without spills." The Season has seen racing unsurpassed in the Circuit's history for consistent excitement. It all began in April, at the Edinburgh Students Charities Cup Race Meeting, with a monster entry after the winter lay-off. Indeed, with some 56 saloon car entries the organisers had to heat the saloons off in the morning, an event unheard of in the history of the Circuit. The process of elimination did, however, throw up a new saloon car king and, possibly, the personality of the year at the Circuit. Unnoticed during 1969 in his occasional drives with a Twin Cam Anglia, Dougy Niven went on from his win in April to clinch the Hartley Whyte Championship and the B.M.R.C. Trophy at the earliest possible date.

April also saw the beginning of the now almost traditional Libre thrash. Willie Forbes and Graham Birrell went out to repeat their tremendous battle in the same meeting in 1969 and they did not let the crowds down. The really memorable Libre races were reserved for July and August however, when the Irish Formula 2 brigade turned Ingliston into their own personal playground. After a scorching start by the wilyest Aberdonian of all time, Willie Forbes, the Irish trio of Cullen, Reid and Nelson set out to show what Formula 2 racing is all about—and in the process they sliced very nearly a second off the lap record which everyone had thought to be a timekeeper's mistake until then! In August it was the turn of Reid, Nelson and Fildes to wave the Irish flag and this they did with such success that the same flag would have been hard put to to cover the leading duo as they crossed the finishing line.

September was the odd man out of 1970. For the first time ever no Formula Libre race was held and the principal honours of the day were given over to the Formula Ford and Formula 4 cars. "Drab" and "uneventful" was how "The Scotsman" saw the result while, on the other hand, "Motoring News" looked upon the Meeting as "one of the best in recent months." The Editor certainly knows who he believes! Certainly, it was the Ford's day and they made the most of it. Two first-class heats were followed by a scorching final in which Damien Magee and Peter Hull fought out the lead in the Kings Cup Formula Ford Championship. A feature of the race, apart from the classic battle for the lead, was the terrific dice for third place going on between Brian Harrison and Dave Manners until, at the very end, Brian lost it and fell back to fifth place. September was also a day for the saloons, seeing two of the most exciting saloon car battles yet. Prime mover in these was Jenny Birrell who once and for all proved that there is Birrell blood coursing through those veins of hers.

1970 too has seen consistently good Modified Sports car races, as also much improved G T fields. The event of the year to many must be, however, the visit of World Champion Jackie Stewart in May. With his brilliant display of driving and unflagging enthusiasm and cheerfulness, Jackie endeared himself to the 13,500 spectators who packed into the Circuit to see him. Let us hope that it is not too long before we see him behind the wheel of a car at Ingliston again.

And what of today? With no crystal ball to help, one can only hope that the closing Meeting of the 1970 Season will see as close and exciting a day's sport as we have come to expect during the rest of the year. On paper, however, it very much looks as if the pattern of the year will again be confirmed. A closely fought Modsports race, a cracking good Formula Ford battle for the Kings Cup Championship, the scream of Special G T cars vying with one another for the chequered flag-all will be present. Perhaps the two events of the day, though, will be those which have given 1970 a character all of its own at the Circuit. With the Callands Trophy Championship wide open, the Formula Libre event promises to see yet another Formula 2 slipstreaming battle to determine just what "Furrinner" will have the honour of carrying the Trophy back over the water to Ireland. And last but not least the big Saloon Car race should see one of the most monumental battles (literally) ever to be witnessed at Ingliston. To finish once again with the superlatives of our revered Secretary to the Meeting, "it's the best saloon car entry I've ever seen"

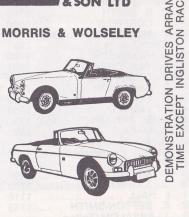

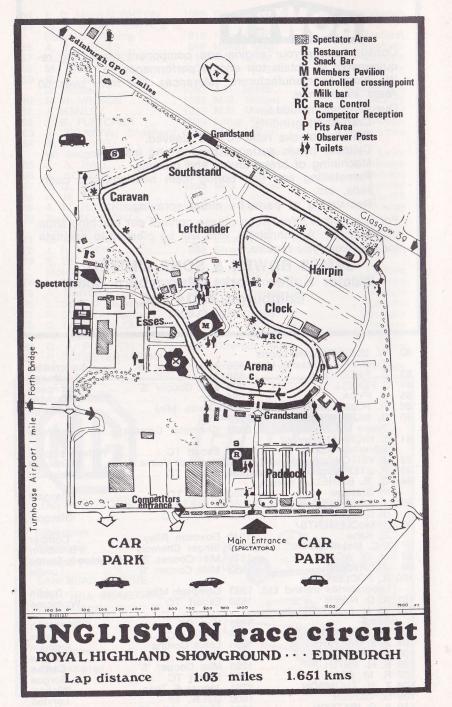

INGLISTON NOTES

You may be surprised to know that something like 500 voluntary officials are required to run a race meeting at Ingliston. Without their assistance there just would not be any racing and we would ask you to co-operate with them so as to ensure the enjoyment of every person, whether they be spectator, competitor or official. Your safety depends on them and we do ask you not to jeopardise their's or others' by disregarding their instructions.

Please remember that :-

Dogs are not permitted in the Showground during race meetings.

Racing "goodies" are on sale from Graham Birrell immediately behind the Grandstand.

Details of programme advertising and facilities for selling goods at Ingliston are available from Scotcircuits Ltd., National Bank Chambers, Duns, Berwickshire.

Details of trackside advertising may be obtained from Aerosigns (London) Ltd., Marlbrough Hall, Lassel Street, London, S.E.10.

For those who run out of film this afternoon, photographic goods are available from Reg. Forester Smith immediately behind the grandstand.

Racing at Ingliston has been made possible by the courtesy of the Royal Highland and Agricultural Society whose Showground this is. Please return this courtesy by respecting their property, and refraining from climbing on buildings or scattering litter.

* * *

At various points around the circuit there are teams of marshals whose duties are to signal by means of flags various information to the drivers. A blue flag held stationary means "there is a car close behind"; blue flag waved means "the car behind wishes to overtake." Yellow flag held stationary means "caution"; waved vigorously means "extreme danger, be prepared to stop." A yellow flag with red stripes signifies oil on the track, and a white flag means there is a service vehicle (ambulance, fire engine, etc.) on the circuit. You may see an official at the entry to the Esses holding a black flag together with a blackboard on which will be chalked a number. This means that the competitor whose number is on the board must immediately slow and drive gently to the pits. It may be that observers have reported some parts of his car loose or it may be that in the opinion of the Clerk of the Course he is driving in such a way as to cause danger to others.

Tickets for the main Grandstand, price 10/- each, are available from a kiosk immediately behind the Crossing Point to the Central Enclosure in the centre of the main Grandstand: why not treat yourself to a spot of luxury and buy a seat (or two)? For those who prefer the South Grandstand, tickets, price 6/-, are available at that stand.

Feeling peckish? Hot drinks, pies and bridies and roll sandwiches are available at the Snack Bars situated in the Herdsman's Restaurant on the ground floor of the MacRobert Pavilion, in the East Gate Yard and in the area between Caravan and Southstand corners. If you feel like a quick "pinta" why not get your milk drinks in the Milk Bar at the east end of the Grandstand. Cigarettes are on sale from the Players Kiosk situated behind the main Grandstand.



For those whose idea of a meal extends beyond a "pie and a pint" D. S. Crawford Ltd. provide Club Members with three-course luncheons in the MacRobert Pavilion for 11/6. Other members of the public can lunch in the Herdsman's Restaurant (north of the main Grandstand) where they may enjoy, *inter alia*, the following dishes: Soup or Fruit Juice 1/3, Braised Steak 6/6, Veal and Ham Pie with Chips 5/6, Fresh Gammon or Ham with Salad 6/6, Haddock and Chips (high teas only) 5/6, Apple Tart with Fresh Cream 1/9, Fruit Salad with Fresh Cream 2/6. Dinner is also served to Club Members in the MacRobert Pavilion after the close of racing and the Club Bar remains open there from 12.30 to 2.30 and 6.30 to 9.30.

Newcomers to Motor Racing may well be puzzled by some of the activities going on during the afternoon. Between every race the Course Car will be driven round by the Clerk of the Course or Chief Marshal, making an inspection of the condition of the surface and safety precautions. You will always know this car by the white flag it carries. Starting procedure has to be absolutely cut and dried, for it is not easy to keep a car running on the 'grid'—as the starting line is called—without "creeping" forward, or without overheating the engine. Three minutes before the start a siren will be sounded and the cars will then move onto the track and complete a warming-up lap, forming up on a dummy grid at the entry to the Arena. The siren will again be sounded at 1 minute when the cars move forward onto the grid, and with 30 seconds to go the starter will walk to his rostrum. With 5 seconds to go he will slowly raise the saltire and drop it smartly for the "off."

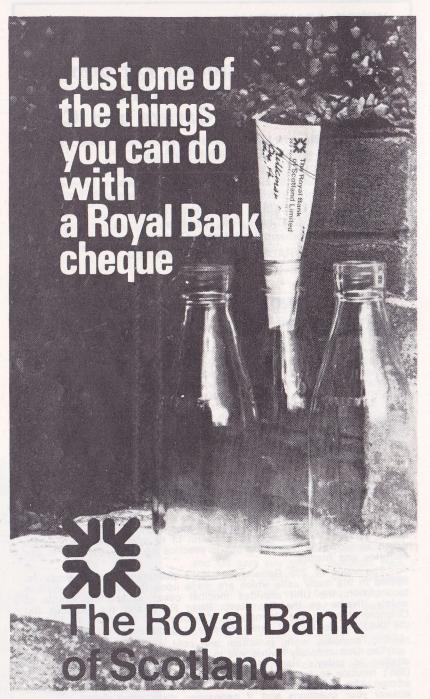
205 Scottish General Hospital RAMC(V), based in Glasgow, with detachments in Edinburgh, Inverness and Dunoon, now provides an important part of the medical cover for the Ingliston Race Meetings. This volunteer Unit is part of Britain's Reserve Army. In a recent issue of a professional magazine this type of Unit was referred to as a 'shadow' hospital. And, of course, in the context of Britain's defence plans this description is perfectly correct. From there on, however, the description loses its cogency because in the context of its peacetime training the 'shadow' quickly gives way to 'substance.'

This hospital is part of the Territorial and Army Volunteer Reserve and, as such, is the only military hospital in Scotland today. It is officered by doctors and nursing sisters and staffed by men and women from a widely representative cross-section of Scottish life, who have devoted their spare time to learning the many techniques and disciplines which are practised in a modern general hospital. Although training to take their place in Britain's defence in time of war they bring to the everyday life of Scotland a wealth of knowledge and experience which all too often has to be put to practice on our roads and in our factories and homes.

The value of 205 General Hospital's peacetime role is amply reflected in the many calls which are made upon its services. In addition to Ingliston, the Unit provides medical cover at sporting events as widely diverse as the Ben Nevis Road Race and the Scottish Ski Championships in the Cairngorms. Considerable emphasis is laid on the outdoor life and all ranks receive a good basic training in map-

reading, compass work, mountain and cold weather techniques too.

The Unit cordially invites you to come along and see their demonstration at today's Race Meeting—you're sure to find it interesting. Don't hesitate to put your inquiries to any of the officers or men and women who are taking part in the demonstration. They'll be glad to answer your questions and, if necessary, dispel your doubts!

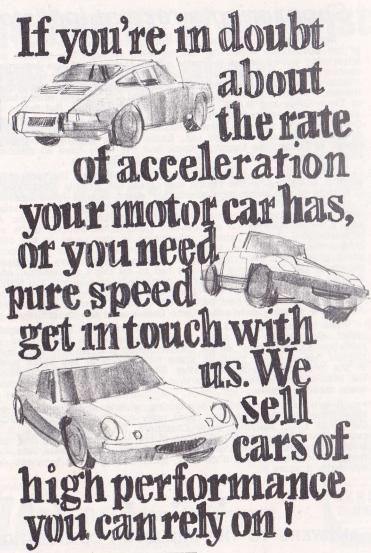

It's very much championship day at Ingliston today and the Modified Trophy" Championship by a very short cowiling is the Felton Motor Company's John Absalom with his exceedingly fast Cosworth/Lucas Ginetta G4. John once again lowered the Modsport lap record at the last Meeting and proved that the definition for this Marque definitely does mean "modified." Indeed, John's 1970 achievements list makes even Jackie Stewart look like a novice-eight outright wins, eight class wins, and lap records at Ingliston, Croft, Rufforth, Mallory Park, and Silverstone. Second in the Championship, however, is Dundee star Alex Souter with his Lotus Elan.

Neither Alex nor John Absalom had it all their own way in September, however, since a newcomer to the Circuit, Jon Fletcher, gave them both a very hard run for their money before having to retire. Jon's previous successes include ten wins this year and lap records at Croft, Rufforth, Cadwell Park and a shared lap record at Ingliston (no, you clot, not in the same class as John Absalom). Indeed, both Alex Souter and Jon Fletcher lowered the lap record in September and his return promises a first-class dice at the front.

The Irish menace in this race is provided by John Hanley with his MG Midget. John will have to go exceedingly fast, however, to catch Ewan Sefton-Smith who brings his incredibly fast Chris Steel powered Midget up from the deep South to challenge his friend David Langley on the latter's home ground. Ewan apparently showed David a clean pair of heels down South not so long ago and the Scottish driver prevailed upon him to come North for a return bout. Certainly, this could be a very good match since David's Sprite is not noted for its tardiness.

In the supercharged division, Bill Dryden has another shot at the honours with the H. & G. Robinson Racing Honda while John Milne will be having his hands full of Midget power. Certainly, all the ingredients for another first-class modsports dice.

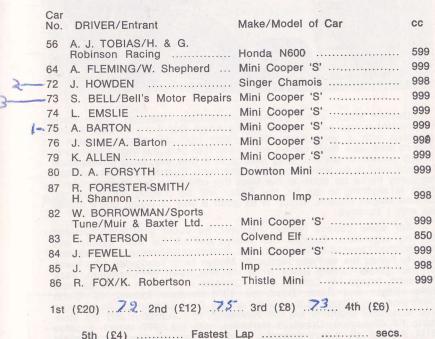

It's been a difficult season for the small saloons, with no one driver establishing any set dominance. The season started with a record-breaking run by Carlisle-based driver Sedric Bell but, although he has since been travelling remarkably quickly, Sedric has been unable to keep out in front all the time. His one-time tutor, Andy Barton, has been one of the menaces, while "Box" Borrowman has provided a fair bit of competition from the Scottish side of the Border. The man who has suddenly come back into his own with a bang this year, however, has been Edinburgh's own Jim Howden. A prominent feature at the front of all the saloon car races in 1968, Jim was not quite so successful last year. This season, however, has been a much happier one for him and his Chamois has rarely been out of the top three. Indeed, he now shares the class lap record with shifty Sedric. (Where on earth does the Editor get all these ridiculous nicknames frommakes them up as he goes along, I shouldn't wonder.)

Competition is provided from the far North by Lewis Emsley who has fitted a new Cooper "S" engine to his car. For the life of us we are having considerable difficulty in identifying the make of his mount since he has described it on his entry form as a "Lewis Emsley"! Surprisingly enough, however, the driver is not shown as being Mini Cooper. Seriously though, while that may have been a slip of the pen. Lewis will be hoping that it is the only slip he has at this Meeting! More at home in Hillclimbs, where he is presently leading his class in the Championship, is Ken Allen with his Mini Cooper "S," while Reg. F.S. will once again be pushing the leaders with his Shannon Imp. The Irish menace comes from Tony Forsyth whose Downton Mini is presently lying second over-all in the Northern Ireland 1000 c.c. class Championship.

All right then, now it's your turn to stick your necks out. In the last Programme the Editor put his out on a limb and predicted the possible winner in advance. (Granted, he did spread the prediction just a wee bit but that's a mere technicality!) Now it's your turn-see if you can name the eventual winner. The Editor certainly can't-all he will predict today is that the racing will be as close as always.



Damien Magee's win in the John McBain Memorial Trophy Race in September has now opened up the Kings Cup Formula Ford Championship with a vengeance. While Peter Hull still has, on paper, a 4-point lead, one must always remember that only the best four scores in any season count and that, looking at it that way, both drivers must be reckoned to be level pegging for the lead. Things should accordingly be pretty fierce up there at the front this afternoon but, if September's form is anything to go by, the Editor will be placing his money on Demon Magee himself. Which is as good a way of losing one's money as any, I suppose.

For some curious reason, however, no doubt greatly appreciated by the organisers, Damien has roused out all his Irish friends and driven them over the water for this afternoon's Meeting. Thomas Mc-Kinney brings the ex-Patsy McGarrity Merlyn from Tandragee (the home of your genial Tommy Reid) while the Kirkistown FF Champion, Jack Davidson, brings his Crossle over. Crossles are also in evidence from Brian Edgar and Derek Boyd, the 1970 Northern Ireland Hill Climb Champion and Ulster Automobile Formula Ford Champion. In amongst this illustrious group is the '68 Kirkleston FF Champion and '69 Mondello FF Champion, Crawford Harkness, with his 1970 mount, a Lotus 61M. All and all, a very powerful Paddy Package—indeed, today might almost be called a "Scotland v. Ireland" 'National.

Just to make things truly international, two works entries from England really stir the broth up. John De Stefano brings the Titan-Lucas with which he won the Northern Formula Ford Championship this year while Richard Mallock takes over the Mallock U2 usually driven by Terry Horrocks. Terry, however, changes his allegiance for this Meeting to Alexis and will no doubt be going all out to show the boss the way around Ingliston.

Did we say "Scotland v. Ireland" earlier! Now that we come to tot it up, it very much looks like Ireland v. Ireland, there being very few Scottish competitors in this race in fact. Those that are, however, are well able to uphold their country's honour. Leading the group (well, someone has to be first) is the wet-weather ace Ted Clark, while a similar car, although a newer model, is driven by Neil Ginn, formerly from Helensburgh. The newest mount of them all, however, is that of Edinburgh man Bernie Hunter, who purchased his Hawke just before the last Meeting. In typical form, Bernie ran this in remarkably well and will certainly be doing his best to keep his nose cone out of the exhaust fumes. All and all, pretty good potential and about as drab and uneventful as a couple of sticks of dynamite.

Two names instantly spring to the fore—Australian Brian Muir, winner of the 1970 Tourist Trophy, brings the incredibly powerful Wiggins Teape Chevvy Camaro to the Circuit while 1969 British Saloon Car Champion Alec Poole tries his hand with his Turbocharged Mini. For those who feel that Minis have no look-in against the big Escorts, just watch the Complan Mini as it charges down the back straight—certainly, Alec has no trouble whatsoever demolishing the Irish Escorts. Chevvy Camaros are quite another thing, however, and if Brian can power the bigger car away at the start heaven only knows how anyone is going to get past him!

The local opposition will doubtless be provided by Hartley Whyte Champion-elect Borderer Doug Niven, and by Messrs Birrell both of whom are described on their entry form as "known to Commentator." Funny . . . ! Most interesting feature of the Wylie's entries, however, is that Jenny is driving a 1300 cc Escort. Wonder what happened to the big engine? And talking of big engines, Jimmy Veitch will be out once again in his V8 Veeva. Ringing the changes on Ford power is John Calvert with his FVA Ford Cortina.

Another incredibly fast Paddy-wagon is the Downton Riley of the 1969 Ulster Saloon Car Champion, Jim McClements, another Mini which has been known to scare a few Escorts in its time. Not too worried about the Mini menace, however (although perhaps he should be), is Lawrie Hickman with his Gerry Edmonds Racing Escort TC. With 5 lap records with a Group 5 Escort and a class win at the British Grand Prix Meeting under his belt, Lawrie will be all set to add to his French and Danish successes with another "foreign" win in Scotland. Other Escorts are fielded by Paul Stephenson and Bob Caig while Bill Dryden tries to uphold the Vauxhall honour with his Viva GT.

And after all that, there's no room to talk about the regular drivers at Ingliston. Who said we never provide new names and new faces!

A fine representative field has been gathered together for Ingliston's first Historic Racing Car event. Six of these cars are supercharged, and the sounds from their engines, plus the smell of their methanol racing fuel and the sight of their drivers struggling to control powerful cars whose roadholding is not up to modern standards, should add up to something quite memorable.

Favourite to win the race will be an E.R.A., possibly in the blue-and-yellow colours of Prince Birabongse of Siam, for two of the cars "Bira" used to race so successfully before the war are running today—"Remus" driven by the Hon. Patrick Lindsay and "Hanuman" driven by Bill Morris. A third E.R.A., painted black, in the hands of Patrick Marsh, was originally owned by Richard Seaman. These cars have six cylinder 1½ litre supercharged engines with two high camshafts and short push-rods, based upon the Riley engine. The beautiful silent gearchanges made by their drivers are due to the fact that the cars all have pre-selector gearboxes.

In the pre-war voiturette races the Italian Maseratis were the chief rivals of the E.R.A.s (the initials stand for English Racing Automobiles), and a supercharged six cylinder twin overhead camshaft Maserati is entered here today driven by Ray Fielding, from Forres. Known as the 6C 1500, this beautiful red monoposto (single-seater) was built in Bologna in 1936, and is the only car in today's race with independent front suspension.

To oppose these voiturettes is a genuine Grand Prix car from the mid-'thirties era. This is one of the famous 2.9 litre supercharged straight eight cylinder Type B Monoposto Alfa Romeos, popularly called the P3. This particular car started life as a 2.6 litre in 1932, and was brought up to 2.9 specification in 1934. Belonging to Neil Corner, it is driven by Peter Waller, whose father raced an Alvis at Brooklands, and who has himself been racing an E.R.A. with much success for the past twelve years. The P3 Alfas raced by the Scuderia Ferrari were the supreme Grand Prix cars of the early 'thirties before the Mercedes and Auto Unions came on the scene, with more victories than their rivals the Bugattis and Maseratis. The most famous P3 driver was Tazio Nuvolari. The P3s are at their best on fast circuits with long straights, so Ingliston is not really a P3 circuit, though it would probably have appealed to Nuvolari, reminding him of the park circuits in Milan and Turin. This P3 has the later strengthened 3-speed gearbox, and the unusual divided prop-shaft transmission unique to the P3s.

Colin Readey's Riley, although unsupercharged, is nearly as fast as the E.R.A.s. It is a T.T. Sprite with a six cylinder 2 litre engine. Fitted with a four cylinder engine, it was one of the works team cars which ran in the 1935 and 1936 T.T. races on the Ards Circuit, Belfast, and later belonged to Bob Gerard. Jonathar. Abson's Lagonda Rapier has a four cylinder twin overhead camshaft unblown engine, stretched from the standard 1100 cc. to 1485 c.c. by Elliot Elder in his Edinburgh

workshop. Supercharged 1100 c.c. Rapiers were raced at Brooklands before the war, but this larger capacity car is unique.

The 'twenties were the hey-day of the Bugatti racing car, and the 2 litre Type 35 in unsupercharged form first appeared in the 1924 French G.P. at Lyons, with its shapely body and unique aluminium wheels. Hamish Moffatt's unsupercharged 2.3 litre car looks identical to the Lyons originals, even to having narrow beaded-edge tyres. Neil Corner drives a 1930 2.3 litre Type 35B with a similar straight eight cylinder single overhead camshaft engine, but supercharged. This particular car is one of the fastest vintage racing cars in the country today, and Neil is one of the most successful vintage drivers.

Bentleys are famous for their string of wins at Le Mans in the twenties. Kaye McCosh's car has a 4½ litre four cylinder single overhead camshaft engine in a 3 litre chassis, and a few years ago averaged well over 100 m.p.h. for an hour at the Monthlery track near Paris

driven by its previous owner, Gordon McDonald.

Finally, we have a famous old Brooklands car now resident in Scotland and driven by Keith Schellenberg, also well-known in bobsleigh and power boat racing. This is the huge single-seater Barnato Hassan Special powered by a six cylinder 8 litre Bentley engine. Built as a track car, it held the Brooklands lap record in 1935 at 142.60 m.p.h., later putting its lap speed up to 143.11 m.p.h. Though theoretically thoroughly unsuited to road racing, nevertheless at Oulton Park Keith once led all the E.R.A.s with this car until his brakes gave out, and he will undoubtedly have to make use of all the road and possibly some of the grass verges as well today in trying to do a repeat performance.





At long last we once again have a potential GT grid which should have you all sitting up and biting your fingernails. A positive host of Chevrons takes to the field, led by the familiar faces of Andrew Fletcher, Logan Morrison, Dave Farnell and Graham Birrell. Graham, with his split new B16, will be trying everything he knows to stir things up today but the main feature of this race must be the dice between Dave Farnell and Andy Fletcher for the Sheila Whyte Tankard Championship. With only one point between them, today's race will be the deciding factor-spectators should remember, however, that the best four scores only count and that, consequently, should Dave achieve first or second place, the four points which he scored in August would no longer be added to his total. His maximum pointage now possible is therefore thirty points but this is also the total which Andy Fletcher would achieve even if he only comes second today. The racing should, therefore, be very fast and furious between these two to determine just who is going to carry off the £100 first prize.

Qut to disrupt things, however (and do goodness knows what damage to the Sheila Whyte Table) are two of our many Irish competitors. Derek McMahon provides the GT threat with his Chevron BMW while his fellow countryman, Archie Phillips, brings his split new Chevron B16 Sports Racing car. Archie may well be providing some pretty close competition to the leaders today, having been in his time Irish Saloon Car Champion and Sports Car Champion. Doing battle with him in a similar car, but FVC powered, is the well-kent face of Brian Robinson who recently piloted this car home to a first at the September Cadwell Park International.

Down amongst the smaller GT's Grahame McWilliam and Eddie Labinjoh resume their season-long battle in the now legendary Mercury v. Fisher dice while the fastest Modsports, if required, will again be invited to challenge their bigger brothers. The Clubman's side of things is ably represented by Bob Glass with his "Cosbay"—well, that's what he calls it—powered Mallock U2 and Geoff Temple with the very first Chevron ever built. To those of you who are wondering just what a "Cosbay" is (as was the Editor until recently!) it appears that it consists of a Holbay top with a Cosworth bottom. Depending on which way you look at it it's definitely upside down! Also in the weird and wonderful class (namewise that is) is the Jabs Mk. 1. All we can say about this is that it has two seats, two carburetters, four cylinders and a 1500 cc. Ford engine. Curiously enough, it's also a prototype!

What today's Formula Libre grid may lack in quantity it more than makes up for in quality, containing as it does many of the regular Irish Formula 2 competitors who have injected a new lease of life into this event during the 1970 season. And, as a tit for lat, it is very much on the cards that the circuit will be injecting a further £500 into the Irish competitors' pockets after today's race. Yes, that is the prize money shared between the first three places in The Callands Trophy Formula Libre Championship and, with all three of these places in Irish hands, it looks like a 1-2-3 for the Shamrock brigade today. Leader in the Championship, by a mere two points, is Ken Fildes from Dublin, who's Crossle 19F is now becoming a regular sight to the fore at many F2 races in Britain. Breathing so close behind his exhaust pipes that they are almost sitting on his aerofoil are both Tommy Reid and Brian Nelson, two Irishmen who have taken the International trail with their F2's this season.

All three of these cheerful individuals (which is the best way of dealing with these Irish—when they get together in a crowd on Sunday nights at the bar in the MacRobert Pavilion it's blue ruddy murder!) are pretty well versed in the "whys and wherefors" of Ingliston, having been intimately connected with two of the best Libre dices yet seen at this circuit. The first was at the last National British Meeting in July when Willie Forbes' long-standing lap record was well and truly demolished by no fewer than four drivers. The honours, race and recordwise, eventually went to Brian Nelson but not before the lead had been held by the same four cars one after the other. The hairpin proved to be the trouble for Brian Cullen and for Tommy Reid on that occasion, both making minute errors there—minute or not, however, they were sufficient to let Brian Nelson storm past into the lead and gave him a further 10 points in the Callands Table.

August saw the next meeting between the Reid, Fildes and Nelson trio and, throughout the whole of the 25-lap race, they seemed extraordinarily loathe to part company. Brian Nelson established an early lead from Tommy but, by the half-way stage, the beautifully turned out red and yellow Brabham of Reid was out in front. For a while things were pretty tense up there until Brian "went to sleep" for a lap or two and fell back dramatically. It almost looked as if Ken Fildes (who



was not exactly motoring slowly by any manner of means) was going to take him for second place when, during the closing laps, Brian put on a terrific spurt to close right up to Tommy. The effort was too late, however, for the Brabham crossed the line inches ahead of his Crossle. A quick glimpse at the Callands Trophy Table after that race confirmed everyone's suspicions that the whole operation was a Machiavellian plot, cooked up by the Irish, to carry "all that luvly money" (as Tommy once said) over the water. Certainly, with half their banks on strike, some ready cash would no doubt come in very handy. The only question that remains now is, whose hands will be on the coveted £250 first prize.

The only Scot who can possibly upset the plot now is Willie Forbes, twice winner of the Callands Trophy and unlucky not to be better placed this year, having been forced to retire with suspension problems while leading in both the July and August races. The lure of the tracks is now losing its potency for the wily Aberdonian, however, and today could be the last time we see him on the Scottish circuit (in a competitive capacity, that is)—while the Editor, and, no doubt, spectators, sincerely hope that this is not the case there are possibilities of an early retirement from racing. If that is so, it would be fitting indeed were he to achieve a hat-trick and carry off the Callands Trophy for the third year running. Theoretically possible that this may be, the odds are very much against it since it would almost require all three Irish leaders not to finish. Only time will tell, but the one thing that is certain is that, if the big yellow Lola is on form today, Willie will be a hard man to pass. With 5 litres of power behind him he will be into the Eesses in the lead and, as everyone knows, there are very few people who can say that they have got round Willie Forbes at Ingliston.

Another "far Northerner" who is not renowed for his loitering habits is Ronnie Mackay. Ronnie, merely two points behind Willie in the Championship, will be pitting the Shannon tuning technique against that of Southern demon tweaker, Brian Hart (who is wholly responsible for the incedible speeds that he Irish achieve—don't believe the drivers when they say that skill is involved: like any good train driver they just point and press!). Two English twin cams from Bill Creasey and Geoff Friswell will be stirring things up, however, while local drivers Eddie Labinjoh and lan McLaren will be trying to uphold the native honour. Returning again with his $3\frac{1}{2}$ litre Oldsmobile powered Brabham is 1969 Callands runner-up from Wales, Dave Berry. Dave has had a pretty sorry season at Ingliston on his ventures North of the Border this year but he will be hoping today to reverse that trend.

Should the grid be depleted by this afternoon the long-suffering Formula Fords will be invited, in the usual way, to make up the numbers. If the truth be known, the FF competitors are only too keen to have another bash just for the fun of it. And it can prove to be pretty profitable for them too! Certainly, do not be misled into thinking that all the action takes place up at the front — further down the field (although not too far) yon can bet your boots that the Fords will be having a whale of a dice.
