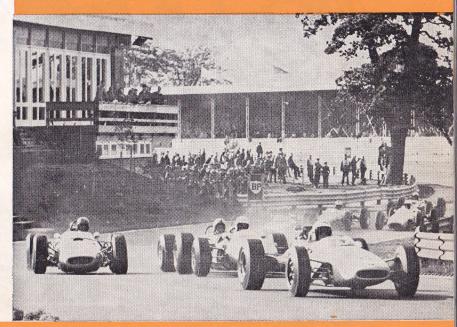

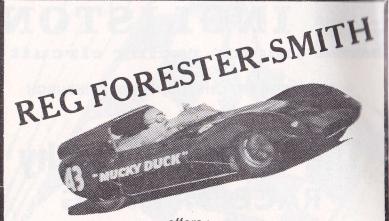

For your Day's Enjoyment ...

The Scottish Motor Racing Club have certainly made sure that the twentieth meeting at Ingliston will be memorable, for they have gathered together the most star-studded entry list since the hey-day of Charterhall some fifteen years ago when the old airfield reverberated to the banshee howl of the two V16 BRM cars of Reg Parnell and Ken Wharton and the deep roar of Nino Farina's Thinwall Special—and all three were beaten by the brilliant driving of Bob Gerard (whose son Julian has returned to compete at Ingliston today) in an ageing E.R.A. of pre-war vintage. It has always been the ambition of the organisers to attract the cream of Britain's non-graded drivers, and they have done just this today. Half today's entry is Scottish, and although most of the visitors are from South of the Border, we have Irishmen, a German, two Australian, an American, a Channel Islander, a Welshman—and even a competitor from as far afield as Hong Kong!

Main race of the day will be the final round of the "Daily Record" Scottish Racing Car Championship, a two-part race sponsored as last year by Lombank, the well-known finance house. All Ingliston regulars must appreciate in full the great help to motor racing in Scotland that both these "sponsors" give. The "Daily Record" need special mention, for the generous contribution that they have made to the costs of promoting the 1967 meetings has largely been responsible for the magnificent entry—and in fact the generally high standards of entries throughout the season. The large cash prizes awarded for this Championship have done much to ensure a continuity of entry from our leading Scottish drivers, for there have been occasions when drivers like Andrew Fletcher have returned from racing on the Continent especially to compete at Ingliston. The meeting starts today with Fletcher in a commanding position in the Championship, but with a superhuman effort by Willy Forbes, this lead could be lost to the wily Aberdonian.

There are other Scottish single-seater drivers who have supported us regularly and left their mark at previous meetings, in particular John Romanes with his Lotus and Jock Russell with the Russell-Ford, among the larger-engined cars, and Graham Birrell in the Ecosse-Imp and John Millar in his Brabham among the smaller-engined cars. This sextet are certainly at an advantage in their knowledge of the circuit, but potentially the fastest car around Ingliston today should be Chris Lambert's FVA-powered Brabham Formula Two car. Lambert won the F3 "Daily Record" Cup Race at this meeting last year, so is at less of a disadvantage than the other two F2 cars up from the South in the hands of Robert Lamplough and Mike Walker, driving Lola and Brabham respectively but both powered with engines similar to Andrew Fletcher's and Tony Charnell's, the seventh regular home-based driver. Charnell's is an earlier model of Lola than Lamplough's, and Walker's is a much newer Brabham than Fletcher's. As said before, Julian Gerard will be representing the marque Cooper with his twin-camengined Type 73.

There is also a race for single-seaters up to 1000cc today, for the "Daily Record" Cup (not to be confused with their Championship trophy), and it is in this class particularly that we have the cream of Formula Three cars, several of whom will also be taking part in the "Lombank Trophy" races. Spearheading the English attack will be the works-entered Lotus 41 of John Miles—the first time since 1961 that the Lotus factory have entered a car in a Scottish race. Similarly mounted will be Morris Nunn, John Hine and Chris Cox. "Mo" Nunn has been one of the most successful of F3 Lotus drivers this year, and several may remember his hair-raising incident at Silverstone

in one of the British G.P. supporting races when the 41 ran all the way along the front of the main grandstands on the grass! John Hine is one of the most consistent drivers in F3 races today, and Chris Cox's car—all the way from Devon—is the ex-Roy Pike (Charles Lucas) car. Rollo Feilding and Geoff Oliver will be carrying the F3 Brabham banner today, the former in a new BT 21 and the latter in an earlier BT 10, and will be ably supported by the driver made famous by Radio London, Keith S. John, who had the misfortune to blow up his engine in practice for the July meeting.

A comparatively rare F3 car is the Merlyn Mk. 10 of Ian Ashley, but this is undoubtedly one of the best examples of the marque and Ashley has been well-placed in a number of Continental events this year. Frank Lythgoe, whose cars the winner of the "Scotsman" 1966 Trophy Alan Rollinson drives, is sending up two of his team-mates in F3 Brabhams in the personages of Dave Berry and Dave Rees. Berry has been up regularly from Wales this year, finishing third in the Milk Trophy Race, and will be driving the car which Rollinson ditched in flames at the preceding meeting.

Formula Three racing has become the most closely-fought class in single-seater racing in recent years, and it is not unusual to watch a whole group of cars change place lap after lap. At one time at Silverstone on the day of the British G.P. there were 15 cars in one group—any of whom could have won the race! It won't be so easy for them to pass each other at Ingliston, but nevertheless we suspect that this will be a most exciting race.

Today's supporting races also have a top-line entry, and this is especially so in the race for G.T. Cars which often tends to become somewhat processional at Ingliston. With no less than four Lotus 47s and the Nomad-Ford joining battle with the usual Scottish entries there should be a most exciting spectacle in this event. Spearhead of the attack will be by ex-Team Lotus Grand Prix driver (and former teammate of our President) Trevor Taylor, driving the 47 with which he so nearly won the 500Kms Race at Nurburgring on 3rd September. John Hine has Chris Barber's car (which was also at Nurburgring), and we are delighted to welcome back to Ingliston Chris Barber's pea-green livery.

The Lotus factory entry will be driven by John Miles—this being the car which won the 2-litre class in the BOAC 500 Race recently at Brands Hatch, driven then by Miles and Jackie Oliver. The fourth "47" will be in the capable hands of Ingliston regular Bill Dryden, now that the Elan which he has driven regularly for Nick Cuthbert has been sold. This particular car is that with which Johnny Blades so nearly won his race at the SMT Race Meeting, spinning while trying to pass Dryden on the last corner of the last lap. John Nicholson will undoubtedly find his pretty Jaynick GT (a special version of his Lotus 23B) somewhat outclassed in this company, and likewise Andrew Cowan, who so nearly profited by Blades' mistake in July, may only find Harry Ballantine's Marcos GT competitive should it rain.

No Ingliston meeting would be complete without its saloon races, and on this occasion we look like having the father and mother of all dices in the Hartley Whyte Championship's final round for the fastest six cars in each of the two preceding races, with Tony Lanfranchi in this year's works- supported Fraser-Imp racing against Logan Morrison in one of last year's team cars, Gerry Birrell making an all-out effort to clinch the title in the Climax-engined Shannon-Chamois, and both Tony Charnell in his Chamois and Andrew Cowan, Rootes works rally driver, driving the Haggispeed Imp, it will be interesting to see just how many cars can drive abreast through the Esses at Bankers' on the first lap!

Chief interest among the larger-engined cars in Event Two will be Roy Pierpoint's huge Falcon and Dubliner Alec Poole's infamous

Wolseley Hornet, and there is no doubt that the Mini-Coopers of Jim Dryden, Davey Muter, Eddie Labinjoh and Ronnie Morrison will be hard pressed on this occasion! Others in this race include Keith Payne, driving a Lotus-Ford entered by the Hong Kong team which is sponsored by Rothmans Cigarettes; Tom Sleigh and Bill Turnbull in their Jaguar saloons looking somewhat out of place on this mini-circuit, and an unusual car in the shape of Peter Dalkin's Perdal Vitesse.

Finally, although first on the programme, are the Formula Vee cars. Again, this is the final round in their championship, but in this case Nick Brittan has an unassailable lead. Excitement should lie in the battle for second, third and fourth places between Gerry Birrell, Jenny Nadin and Howard Heerey. The remaining works entries will be driven by Mike Haysey and Bill Dryden. Mike Hayselden will be back again on this occasion and will also be bringing his Mini-Cooper from Rotherham. One of the fastest of the non-works entries in Formula Vee is the Weir Lodge Garage entry driven by Peter Danaher, which has come up from Surrey to each meeting this summer-no mean effort and just a measure of how enthusiastic these Formula Vee drivers are. Danaher had fastest lap at Crystal Palace recently, and it could be that the Smithfield—a very pretty English-built car—could be eased out of its place as highest-placed non-works entry with Bob Mason at the wheel Newcomers to Ingliston will be the German driver Alfred Vogiberger, who has been repeatedly well-placed down South, and Brian Muir, the well-known saloon driver from Australia.

It only remains for you to sit back and enjoy the racing as much as we expect to!

We have a new face in the Commentator's Box today to help our old friend Jimmy McInnes. George Humble is a most adaptable person for he is no mean rally driver and racing driver (only a fortnight ago he was to be seen piloting a Ford GT40 around Oulton Park in one of the supporting races to the Gold Cup) whilst spending his spare time from the family insurance business as a part-time commentator at most Northern circuits. Jimmy wants an assistant today because he has been asked to give a demonstration run in a Zagato-Aston-Martin by Hartley Whyte, the man who presented Scottish Motor Racing Club with the magnificent gold trophy that carries his name and is competed for regularly in the ultra-exciting saloon championship. Jimmy McInnes is no mean driver himself in rallies and used to race regularly at Charterhall before marrying fellow-rally-driver Arlene McCracken. The Zagato-Aston is one of a small number of lightweight racing versions of the DB4GT which the Feltham company raced so successfully in the hands of Stirling Moss, Jim Clark, Roy Salvadori and many others in the early sixties.

As a result of the popularity of the arrangements for members of the Scottish Motor Racing Club last year, High Tea will be served from 5.0 p.m. in the McRobert Pavilion—bacon or sausage, egg and chips, haddock and chips, salads, etc. No need to book and the cost is 7/6 per head. There will also be a snackbar for members upstairs and the Bar will be open as usual during normal hours at 12.30 to 2.30 and 6.30 to 9.30. Unfortunately we just cannot vary these hours due to the strange Scottish licensing laws!

Lunches are served (10/-) and there is a Members' Snack Bar upstairs.

Members are reminded that access is on production of their current Membership Card which will admit the holder, his or her children, and one other adult. Assisting in the organisation today and every other race day at ingliston are some 300 marshals, all of whom work on a purely voluntary basis. Without them there would be no racing. Please do co-operate with us and them, because without your co-operation somebody's enjoyment will suffer. Your safety is in their hands; do not jeopardise yours and that of others by disregarding their instructions.



Race-going and cameras go together. This year, Reg Forester-Smith's Camera Centres hold the concession at Ingliston on photographic equipment and they will be glad to see you at their mobile shop behind the stand to discuss or sell cameras or films. Graham Birrell has a mobile accessory shop alongside at which all sorts of "Bolt-on goodies" can be purchased.



You may well feel in need of some refreshment during the day. There are four snack bars in addition to the Herdsman's Restaurant open to the public; one adjoins the Herdsman's, one on the ground floor of the McRobert Pavilion, one at the East Gate and one near Gardeners' Corner. Three course lunches are available from 7/6d. in the Herdsman's. We regret that our caterers have had to slightly increase their charges this year due to the Selective Employment Tax. Catering at Ingliston is in the hands of that well-known Edinburgh firm, D. S. Crawford Ltd. In addition, the Scottish Milk Marketing Board have Milk Bars near Shepherds' Grandstand and in their splendid Pavilica along-side the track at Farmers' Bend.



Newcomers to Motor Racing may well be puzzled by some of the activities going on during the afternoon. Between every race the Course Car will be driven round by the Clerk of the Course or Chief Marshal, making an inspection of the condition of the surface and safety precautions. You will always know this car by the white flag it carries. Starting procedure has to be absolutely cut and dried, for it is not easy to keep a car running on the 'grid"—as the starting line is called—without "creeping" forward, or without overheating the engine. Three minutes before the start a siren will be sounded and the cars will then move onto the track and complete a warming-up lap, forming up on a dummy grid at Merchants' Turn. The siren will again be sounded at 1 minute when the cars move forward onto the grid, and with 30 seconds to go the starter will walk to his rostrum. With 5 seconds to go he will slowly raise the saltire and drop it smartly for the "off."

herds Stand in the East Gate Courtyard Kiosk. Prices are 10/- except for the East Wing of the Highland at 5/-, and the kiosks open at 10.30 a.m. Shepherd's Stand provides a particularly good vantage point.

* * *

At various points around the circuit there are teams of marshals whose duties are to signal by means of flags various information to the drivers. A blue flag held stationary means "there is a car close behind"; blue flag waved means "the car behind wishes to overtake." Yellow flag held stationary means "caution"; waved vigorously means "extreme danger, be prepared to stop." A yellow flag with red stripes signifies oil on the track, and a white flag means that there is a service vehicle (ambulance, fire engine, etc.) on the circuit. You may see an official at the finishing line holding a black flag together with a black-board on which will be chalked a number. This means that the competitor whose number is on the board must immediately slow and drive gently to the pits. It may be that observers have reported some parts of his car loose or it may be that in the opinion of the Clerk of the Course he is driving in such a way as to cause danger to others.

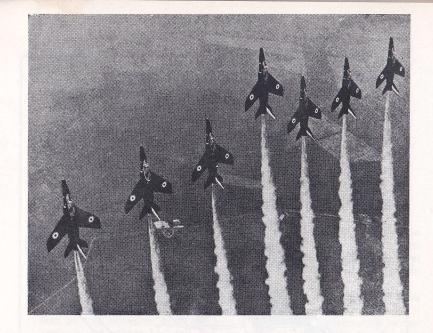

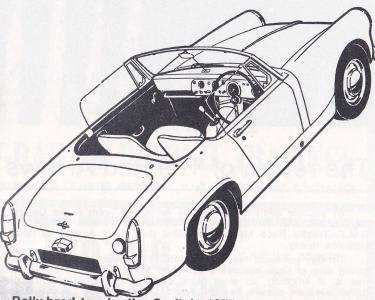
The seven pilots, led by Squadron Leader Raynham Hanna, the 38 year old New Zealand Flying Instructor, really enjoyed their last visit to Ingliston and told us that it gave them particular pleasure to give their display to such an appreciative audience. The other six in the Team are Flight Lieutenant Derek Ball (Stockton-on-Tees), Flight Lieutenant Francis Hoare, Flight Lieutenant Peter Ev ans (Bristol), Flight Lieutenant Roy Booth (Hull), Flight Lieutenant Henry Prince (Canada), and Flight Lieutenant Ernest Jones (Southampton). Henry Prince and Ernest Jones are the two "wingers" who so excited the crowd at their last appearance with their 400mph head-on approaches over the centre of the arena.

The Gnat T.Mk.1 two-seat trainers which the Team use have a maximum level speed of 600mph, rising to 760mph, in a shallow dive. The Gnat is a surprisingly small plane with a wing-span of 24 ft. and, in the Team's bright red livery complete with landing lights burning they certainly help to excite the imagination of everyone who sees them.

The display will start shortly after 2 o'clock and those spectators who have grandstand seats will undoubtedly enjoy the best view of this exciting spectacle if they move forward to the area between the trackside barriers and the grandstand, but we do ask them to return promptly to their seats when the show is finished to enable racing to start.

Who are the Scottish Motor Racing Club?

It is just ten years since the Scottish Motor Racing Club, or to be more correct its parent the Border Motor Racing Club, held its first Race Meeting at Charterhall, and over the past ten years the first Sunday in October has become quite an institution with motor race enthusiasts in Scotland.

The first-ever meeting in 1957 was an historic occasion in one way in that it marked the debut of Jim Clark to motor racing, for it was on this occasion, after watching this unknown Berwickshire farmer score a remarkable hat-trick and win the B.M.R.C. Trophy for the first time, that the late Jock McBain of the Border Reivers Motor Racing Syndicate first decided to re-establish the Team and invite Clark to drive. Other winners of this award have included Jimmy Blumer, Eric Liddell and Anita Taylor.

For the past two years this meeting has had a National Permit, and in 1966 we witnessed a thrilling climax to the "Scotsman" Trophy Championship which was finally resolved with a fine win by Allan Rollinson in his Formula Libre Brabham.

The Scottish Motor Racing Club—in its present form the result of a marriage between the Border Motor Racing Club and the older, but inactive, Scottish Motor Racing Club—has grown from a membership of 138 in 1964 to almost 2,000 at the present date, making it one of the half-dozen largest Motor Sporting Clubs in the British Isles. That most of this enthusiastic response has been due to the establishment of Ingliston goes without saying, but the Club has, nevertheless, much to offer those with an interest in Motor Sport in Scotland. Quite apart from the use of the wonderful MacRobert Pavillon with its Restaurant and Bar, and the discount available on the purchase of tickets at Ingliston, members enjoy receiving monthly the Scottish Motoring Magazine "Top Gear" with its Club section entitled "Wheelspin."

Another privilege which members enjoy is the opportunity of driving one's own car round Ingliston at regular Club Practice Days held every three or four weeks during the Summer on Saturday afternoons. This year the Club is also organising a Members' Race Meeting which is especially designed to encourage newcomers to the sport. The social occasion of the Scottish Motor Sporting Year is without question the Club's annual Dinner Dance in the MacRobert Pavilion in November, when upwards of five hundred members and friends get together to enjoy one of those memorable occasions. Subscriptions paid from to-day onwards will cover the whole of 1968.

Their slickness is so important in keeping the Public interest alive, and, although it may be invidious to mention individuals without thanking the entire Team of Marshals, there is no doubt that much of the success has been due to the hard work of Archie Craig, the Chief Marshal, and Clerk-of-Course Tom Legget.

Scotcircuits and their Board of Directors have long realised that spectators must be considered first and foremost, and as the months have passed have made every effort to improve facilities such as the tiered terracing around much of the Circuit—and at the same time to provide not only the highest possible level of Racing, but also a variety of other attractions which can be enjoyed equally by every member of the family. The appearance to-day of the Red Arrows is just such an example of this far-sightedness.

Scotcircuits and the Scottish Motor Racing Club, heartened by ever increasing attendances, certainly look forward to an even better season in 1968, when Meetings will be held on 14th April, 12th May, 14th July, 11th August, 8th September and 6th October.

Who is this John Romanes?

There certainly seems to be an air of mystery about John Lauder Romanes, whose name keeps cropping up in these Ingliston programmes.

It is time to dispel some of the mystery, for without John Romanes there would be no Ingliston programme, because as Chairman of Scotcircuits Ltd. he has consistently played more than a full part in translating dreams into hard reality. His energies, allied to Ian Scott Watson's original ideas, have created the milieu for to-day's and every other race day's entertainment at Ingliston.

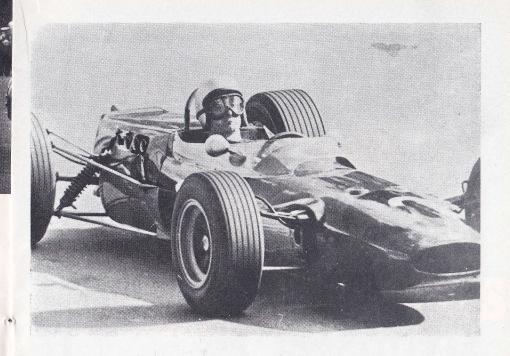
John Romanes left Melville College, Edinburgh, as an 18-year-old in 1941, joined the R.A.F., and on demobilisation refused point blank to return to formal education and the University career his parents had in mind. Motor racing and engineering called harder than training for the family business in Edinburgh, but ignoring the latter meant lacking the wherewithal to pursue the former—a fairly classic situation among would-be racers.

For a good few years he worked, first in the South and then in France, for many of the leading lights of the day, including Raymond Mays, Peter Monkhouse and Ian Connell, and latterly with Raymond Sommer.

He and Doris came back to Edinburgh in 1953, and four years later he found that motor racing and the family business were not necessarily mutually exclusive. Thus in 1957 he was able to start racing on his own account at the tender age of thirty-four, without the benefit of works or other sponsorship. Indeed his motor racing exploits have been singularly individual efforts; his first car at least being built by him from a Chapman kit, and all being wholly maintained by himself.

In the early days, he and Doris had spent all their holidays mooching through Europe, and John had become pretty familiar with all the Grand Prix circuits, but strictly as a spectator. It was in Scandinavia, however, a part of the world he has a particular fondness for, that he did much of his early racing, although perhaps the achievement that gives him the greatest pleasure was to be the first private entrant home in his Lotus 18 at the B.R.D.C. Silverstone Meeting which included the British Grand Prix in 1960.

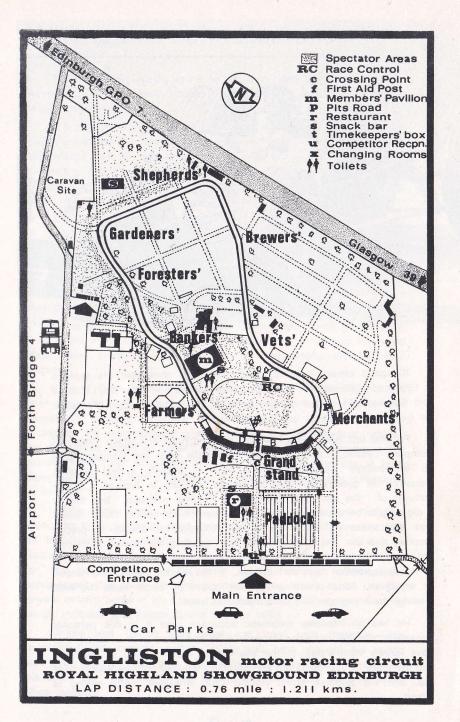
Aintree and Oulton Park were — at least until Ingliston — his favourite British circuits, and he might well have thought his racing was over when at Aintree in 1963 he fractured his spine while racing his Lotus 23. But this is the sort of challenge that John Romanes likes meeting.

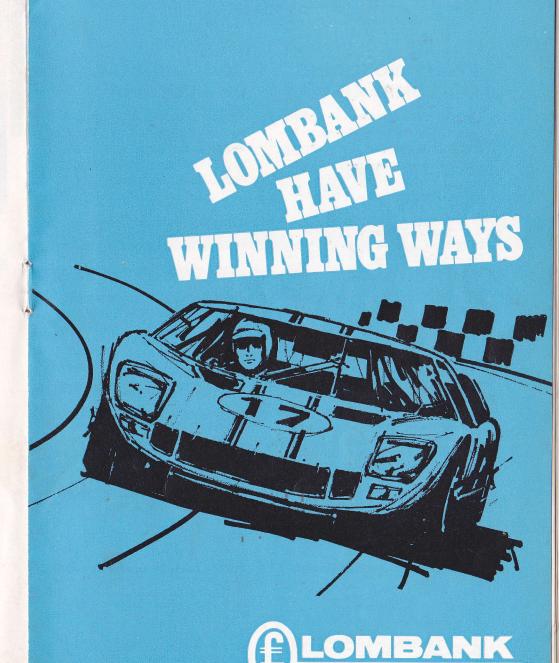


It wasn't always Lotuses; and many will remember his exploits in 1964 and 1965 with an ex-Frank Gardner Brabham. Now it's Lotus 35 and Romanes 44 and the funny thing is, the older he gets the faster he goes.

For the last nine years he has been the boss at Lothian Chemical Company Limited, and those nine years have seen his Company play an increasingly important part in what is anyway a fast growing industry. He gets rather tired of people referring to him as a manufacturer of "the stuff you use to cure footrot in sheep," but this is a dig only to be expected in Scotland, where it seems that motor racing and agriculture go hand in hand. Actually he cracks iso-propylalcohol, and that has nothing to do with bending the elbow! Not that John is averse to that; he has a tremendous zest for living each minute to the full, whether behind the desk, in the works, behind the wheel, or whatever. Fond of letting his hair down, he once made the fatal mistake of letting go with both hands at once.

He has an intensely pragmatic approach, and it is this personal dynamism and his capacity for getting to the heart of the matter that have largely contributed to the success of motor racing at Ingliston, and therefore to the reputation and standing enjoyed both by Scotcircuits Ltd. and the Scottish Motor Racing Club wherever motor racing is talked.

SOME NOTES ON SALOON CAR RACING IN SCOTLAND

Ingliston has made saloon car racing in Scotland. There is no doubt about this for whereas there have always been races for touring cars at Scottish meetings, the full impact of this kind of racing has been exploited on the Edinburgh circuit. Indeed, a meeting at Ingliston without saloons would be unthinkable but it wasn't always like this.

In the early days of motor racing, around fifteen years ago, when circuits like Turnberry and Winfield were dragged into use after chequered wartime service (Charterhall, for instance, seemed to have more than its fair share of crashes), there were few saloons around to scratch up a race and you had the oddest cars running. The late Peter Hughes used to churn round in a Delahaye of pre-war vintage and one of the most colourful characters in those days was Harry Havelock Slack who used to race a Healey Shooting Brake and for his sins inherited me as a son-in-law. Harry had some grand battles with another Healey exponent, Harry Wadsworth, but both were put in the shade by an Aston Martin DB2 driven by our Clerk of Course today. Tom Legget, which was allowed in as a saloon.

The next period for saloon activity came shortly after the Border Motor Racing Club was formed. Today B.R.M.C. are Scottish Motor Racing Club but in the early days of their development Ian Scott Watson and his merry men delighted in having both handicap and scratch saloon events. There was the occasion when Phil Walton from Newcastle entered a Fiat 600 and had some slow practice Iaps. Scott Watson gave him a good handicap then Walton walked away with the race; it was a Fiat Abarth and Phil had simply taken the Abarth badges off. Another Fiat Abarth going the rounds at that time was driven by Richard Shepherd-Barron, and of course we mustn't forget Scott Watson and Jim Clark with their D.K.W. Sonderklasse in which Jim once battled at Crimond with Peter Gordon in an Austin A90 Atlantic. Probably the most incongruous saloon car ever to race was Douglas Bertram's Daimler Conquest which ran at a B.M.R.C. Trophy meeting at Charterhall and surprised a few people.

While saloon-car racing was developing in England it never had the spectator appeal at Charterhall where the big long stranght allowed the fastest cars to run away and hide from everyone else. Still it did help to bring along some drivers. Graham Birrell, for instance, ran an Austin A40 at Charterhall and Jock Russell's first races were in a black Austin A30 with no less than four carburettors.

This then was the background to saloon car racing at Ingliston today. It is probably THE most exciting circuit for saloons. Unlike in these early years when it was a hard job scratching up an entry, the S.M.R.C. officials have to turn down scores of saloon car entries, such is the enthusiasm. That, though, is progress but it's fun to take time out and remember the Scottish pioneers.

And what is Lombank?

This is not an advertisement, but it could just be construed as a plug.

One could imagine that a concern so high and mighty sounding as Lombard Banking, with all its connotations of Lombard Street and Italian bankers of a while back (not to be confused with Zurich gnomes), had been around for quite a while. In fact, however, the story spans but twenty years.

That Lombank should have become so much a household name in that short space of time is in itself 'a most eloquent tribute to the enterprise and ability of Mr. Eric J. P. C. L. Knight. Eric Knight came back from World War Two to the world of credit finance he had known before the war, and like so many others found his old environment no longer sufficiently satisfying. He felt he had something to contribute, and showed his confidence in his own judgment by selling his home to raise the wherewithal to get started. There went with him a handful of people who sensed that here was a man destined to succeed. One of that small band was Gordon Skilton, now General Manager for Scotland of the Lombard Banking Group of Companies. Many of you will recall that Eric Knight, whose photograph appears elsewhere in this issue, was with us last year, but unfortunately he cannot be here today at the Lombank Trophy Meeting.

It is understandable that he is fairly busy, for Lombard Banking are, through their subsidiary Lombank Limited, the largest British hire purchase finance company not directly linked with one of the joint stock banks, but the Group's interests now extend far beyond simple hire purchase finance, and the parent company, Lombard Banking Limited, is engaged in all legitimate bank business, and bridges the gap between merchant banking and joint stock banking.

It doesn't stop even there. In addition to substantial interests throughout Europe and the Middle East, the group own the biggest finance company in Australia and are also big in New Zealand and Canada. That lot would keep most of us fairly busy!

Those concerned in the formation of Scotcircuits Ltd. already had links with the Lombank Group, whose interest in and support of motor racing had done much for the sport since the war. It was natural therefore, that the two should talk, and that Lombank should become associated in the venture.

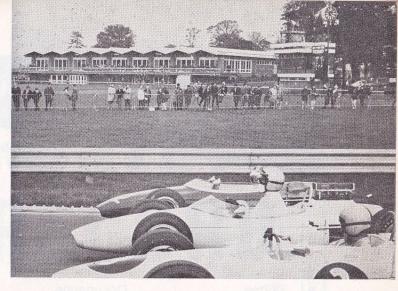

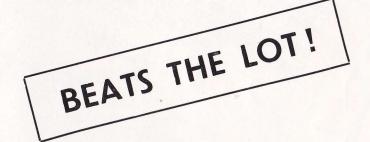

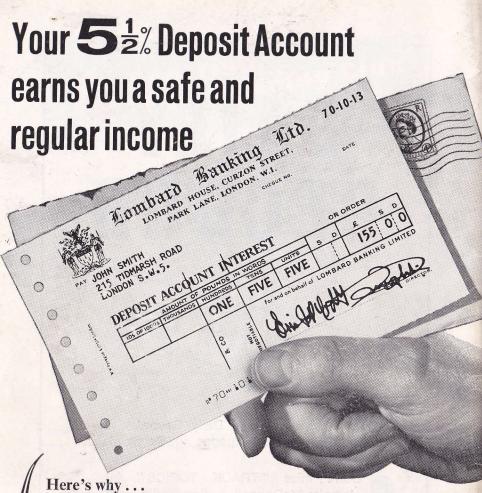
