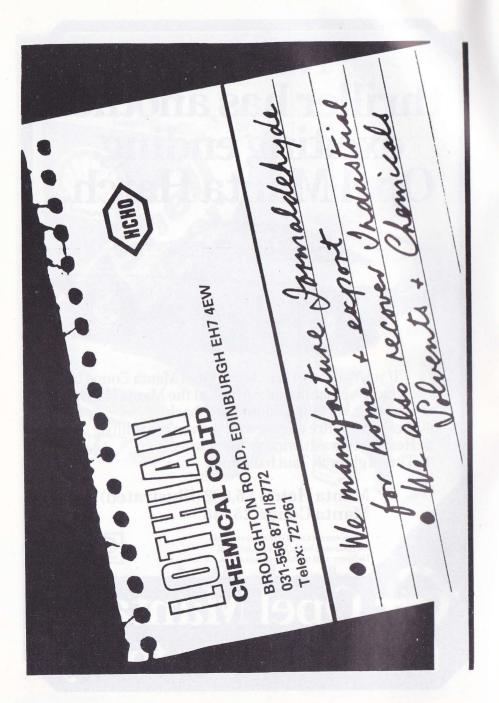

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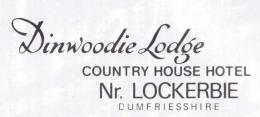

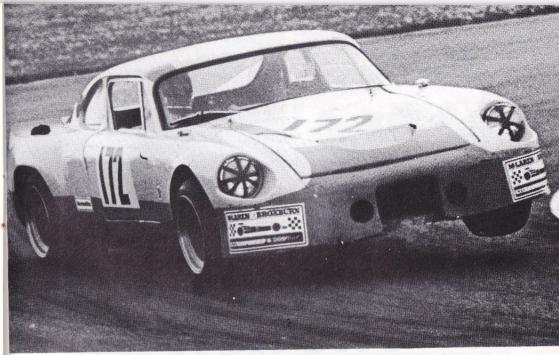

INGLISTON MAKES THE "TON"

Yes, today's Ritchies/Croall & Croall Centenary Race Meeting is the 100th race meeting to be held at Ingliston, now acknowledged as Scotland's most successful motor racing circuit ever. With so much happening in the track's 16 year history there really is no way that anyone could hope to give a definitive précis of even the highlights of these 100 meetings, although elsewhere in this programme we do print some historical "facts and figures", and we also indulge in a very limited trip down memory lane, recalling a couple of great Ingliston races of the past, and a quite at random selection of faces from the past (they just happened to be the drivers we had photographs of!). Any driver whose photograph does not appear should not therefore feel unjustly discriminated against, and conversely any driver whose photo does appear should not thereby consider himself a "superstar". (What we have to print nowadays, just to keep out of court!).

With 100 meetings under the belt, obviously a spot of nostalgia is in order. For example, founder Director and founder Chairman of promoters Scotcircuits Ltd., John Romanes, will be here today (he is one of our Club Stewards, and a depute Clerk of the Course to boot, in any event) while another of his fellow founder Directors, the man primarily responsible for designing the initial circuit, and first Secretary of the Meetings, Ian Scott Watson, should also be on hand. The man who reckons he was on pole position for the very first Ingliston race, Eric Liddel, is also to make his face to be seen this afternoon while the winner of the first official race at the circuit (Ronnie Martin in his Lotus Elan) could well be found amongst the regular spectators. While Andy Barton is perhaps the only driver competing today who was also competing at the first Ingliston, a quick survey of the first race meeting's results discloses a wealth of information about many of our marshals and officials. John Romanes for example, was out in his Brabham in the first ever libre race, as was Jock Russell with his Lotus (want to bet that Jock would miss being at the 100th meeting - after all, if we get a telegram from the Queen who else would we ask to read it for us!). Bill Dryden (now an Observer and depute Clerk of the Course) retired his VX4/90 while fellow Observer and deputy Clerk of the Course, Doug Lamb, took 4th place (there were only 4 finishers, Doug) in his Lotus 11. As for non-

racing Marshals (at least, non-racing at Ingliston) the top honours must go to John "Mac" Macmillan and Jimmy Millar, both of whom are able to claim the incredible distinction of attending all 100 Ingliston race meetings. Longest serving "Chief Marshals" are Archie and Betty Craig, the greatly loved and admired husband and wife Chief Marshal team that served from the outset right up to October of last year — let us all hope that they will be with us today, to celebrate a 'century' of sport on Scotland's longest serving circuit.

To celebrate our 100th meeting we turn to the class of car for which Ingliston has become a byword in motor racing circles — the heavy saloons, (since the north has "gone GT" this year, artistic licence is applied to this definition in our invitation "supercar" race this afternoon). No expense has been spared (Graham Hamilton will blanch when he sees the phone bill for this little lot) in tracking down as many of these monsters as possible, and at the time of going to press the Secretary of the Meeting is still to be found with one hand on the telephone dial, his silken persuasive voice whispering across the country to try to tempt the last couple of available cars up over the Border. First of all, who are confirmed as entries for today's Centenary "Supercars" Invitation Race, Favourite and winner of last year's £400 first prize in the similar Super Saloon event then, is 3 times Scottish Saloon Car Champion, Dougal Niven (101) in the 5 litre VW Beetle which must by now be the most consistently successful car in club saloon racing. Although circulating in practice at Ingliston on 27th April at 49.1 secs., Dougal's team "went the wrong way round" in setting the car up for the first of the GT heats then, where his speed dropped to a "mere" 49.9 secs. With the car not handling as well as it has done, Dougal found his work cut out to keep a determined Lawrence Jacobsen (104) at bay in the immaculately turned-out 2-litre Imp, and although Lawrence was forced to give up the battle when his clutch went on the seventh lap, he had demonstrated on its first outing just what a 2 litre lightweight Imp can do around Ingliston. Certainly this car has enormous potential, and once further developed (as it undoubtedly will be), the big bangers really will have to look to their litres! Some adroit fumbling by Arch and Big Jeff saw a quite different position in the GT Final, however, with Dougal rumbling off into a half lap lead within the first 4 laps, turning in a new GT lap record of 49.0 seconds in the process before his drive shaft went, and with it all further chance of reducing that lap time. The only man in fact to better the magical 49.0 second GT barrier in a like car is Walter Robertson (105), whose DFVW screamed its way to a 48.8 sec., lap last August (while in special saloon trim) and, with Walter aiming to have this back on

top form today after its April 6th accident, we could have a prize confrontation just between the three Scots, Dougal. Walter and Lawrence! Add to that ex-Scottish Hill Climb/Sports Car/Libre Champion lain McLaren in the ex-Jim Evans/Jimmy Robertson 3.4 litre Unipart Skoda, and anything could happen just from the locals. (that goes for the Ritchies Trophy Race for Grand Touring cars and the Invitation Centenary Supercar Race). Forget not either, Murray Burgess (107) in the monster Chevvy Escort (reminiscent of the old Niven Boss Escort) who turned in a solid performance to win that nailbiting GT Final two weeks ago.

Murray's main opposition then came from the determined 1300 c.c. cars of Eric Paterson (126) and Jimmy Robertson (127), Jimmy's Skoda proving to be the faster at a new class lap record of 53.3 secs., although not so reliable as Eric's Robinson Imp. Eric was in fact leading at one point, but not realising this to be the case he let Murray Burgess through since, being in different capacity classes he didn't think it mattered! Not a mistake he's likely to make twice!

And while on the subject of 1300's, don't forget that Brian Stevenson (144) pumped his Davrian round the old track at 51.8 secs last year — this season he's not looked to be just on his best form, but the day will undoubtedly come when he and Gus Young (145), with perhaps the dark horse of the Davrians, lan Forrest (146), will be flexing their throttles in response to the saloon challenge.

The fact is that, at Ingliston, we can be proud of our record of having on a regular basis the finest quality Saloon/GT (call it what you may) grids in the whole country, and perhaps we tend to forget that when we assemble "Supercar" grids. To be honest, and Southern circuit fielding our regular GT entry would be well pleased! Today, however, we add the spice to an already bubbling pot, with the first outing of ex-saloon lap record holder Jim Evan's turbocharged Ford Cosworth Esprit (111). Knowing Jim, and AET Engineering's, undoubted car building skills, this one could be a real eye opener (if you can see it above the barrier, that is — it is low!). Then too there are two of the fastest 2 litre cars outwith Scotland in Tony Sugden's Skoda Coupe (108) and Jim Price's similar S110R (112), both drivers keen to latch into the £1100 prize fund for today's Supercar race. Tony and Jim are, in fact, both its leading contenders in the North of England Special Saloon series (along with David Horsley (135) whose 1300 c.c. Maguire Mini we welcome today to the Royal Highland and Agricultural Society Trophy Race). It is only a pity that two other great 2 litre cars (those of Tony Dickinson and Derek Walker) are to be at Snetterton today! At the other end of the scale, while Mick Hill has decided

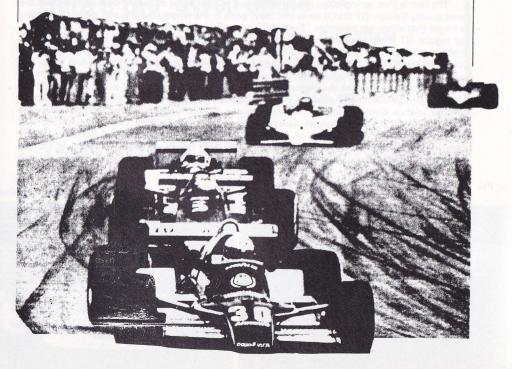

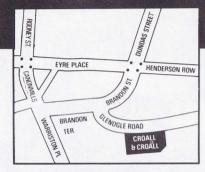

that he is not going to do any races other than Donington GT Champioship rounds this year (and he has confirmed that we will be seeing him at Ingliston on 20th July for his only race this season away from his "home" circuit Donington) the heavy brigade are also ably represented by Doug Emms (109) who, disappointed that the 6 litre Fastback he is building will not be ready on time, has rushed out to arrange a drive instead in the "notorious" Baby Bertha, the 5 litre Vauxhall Firenza so successfully raced by Gerry Marshall a couple of years ago. Also bitterly disappointed that his new 7.2 litre Esprit is not up to schedule is George "Welly" Potter, although at the time of going to price he was pursuing the chance of driving the former Tony Strawson Chevvy Corsair here instead - no guarantee on this one, however, just as we still await word as we write this as to whether Richard Simms will be able to bring his Chevron Skoda. (Speaking of Chevrons, what great news of the Scottish acquisition of the Chevron interest - every success to Robin Smith, Lawrence Jacobsen and Leslie Cuthbertson in their most enterprising venture).

While perhaps over shadowed on paper by the very power of the supercars, the 1 litre brigade will certainly have no less fierce a battle in the Croall & Croall Trophy race today. What a superb 1000 c.c. race we saw on April 27th (indeed, what splendid racing we enjoyed in all the events then), and how refreshing to see Jim McGaughay's red Imp (154) out in front of the Davrians for a while. Both Kenny Coleman (172) and cyclist extraordinary George Coghill (174) will be out to dominate this particular scene today, although Jim McGaughay and his arch-saloon rivals Bob Leckie (151) and Rick Gauld (162) will be determined to make things more than difficult for them. Then too, as it has its teething troubles smoothed out, just watch how that exceedingly handsome Scirocco of Ian Forrest (156) develops!

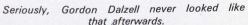

In Formula Fords today the favourite again seems to be Cambuslang's Tom Brown (48), fast establishing himself as the man to beat in the **Shell Championship** races, although none of Bryan Gowans (82), Roy Low (69), Vic Covey (80) or Duncan Hall (60) are going to let him make any mistakes. The point must be made, however, that with practice times of 52.4 (equalling the old FF lap record) Tom is a clear second a lap ahead of his nearest rivals to date. Another man to find himself suddenly ahead of his rivals on April 27th was Ralph Haslley (94) who made a splendid transition from Production Saloons to Single Seaters, romping home the winner of the **Laidlaw Trophy Race** by less than half a second, after a nailbiting display of close competition between 4 or 5 evenly matched cars.

1980 has also seen two epic **Glasgow Herald** races for Libre cars, on both occasions the smaller capacitied formula Atlantic cars just having the edge on the 2 litre F2 machinery. By 27th April, however, it was touch and go between Andy Barton's F. Atlantic March (3) and Stu Lawson's F2 March 772P Hart (14), the honours going to Andy by a short head gasket, although one of the most intriguing runners then was Jim Stevenson (19) who wound his March 782 up to a new lap record at an average of 82.04 m.p.h. With current Hitachi Championship leader David Leslie (8) back in his Ralt today, along with Bernie Hunter's March 80A (7), and with Graham Hamilton (1) determined to get the F1 Surtees TS20S onto the track, we could have some sport in today's **Glasgow Herald** race also!

All in all, a pretty satisfactory sounding sort of a line up for our Centenary celebrations. Just wait, though, for the start of our next 100 race meetings, when we return after the Highland Show, on 20th July. As you have heard, we host a round of the Donington Grand Touring Car Championship that day (a series followed by all of the major English GT competitors) and we also have a chance to see the BMW County Championship circus in a tyre screeching, doorhandle to doorhandle display of "derring-do". Then too, there are whispers that July will see reigning Scottish Libre and Aurora Champion, Norman Dickson. back on home territory with his F1, while the same little birdies are also predicting the possible appearance of no less than 4 Formula 1 cars, including one for Ed Cheever. There will also be our very first Formula Ford 2000 race (a counter in the FF2000 North British Series). Seems like the only excitement your going to get then is the sight of the Secretary cycling (that was his description of what he was doing) around the circuit, so why not make sure of the best possible view and book your Grandstand seat now! DON'T FORGET — BE BACK AT INGLISTON ON 20th JULY:

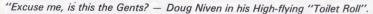
"100 INGLISTON FACTS"

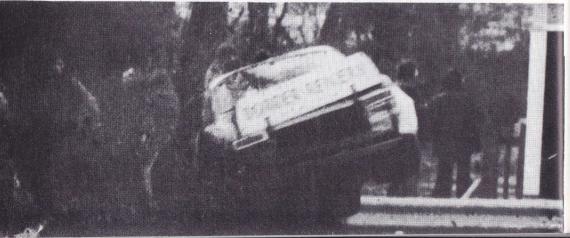
(Researched haphazardly by Ronald Bruce)

While discussing the Ingliston Centenary at the last meeting, a well-known competitor suggested that it would be a good idea to have a page in the programme containing some of the better and lesser known facts about Ingliston since racing ther began. This article is the result of that idea and, as everyone is thinking in terms of 100, an attempt has been made here to gather 100 Ingliston details. If you allow for a little poetic licence in occasionally treating drivers, cars and times as "separate" facts" then hopefully the target will have been achieved — don't count to closely (particularly as only half are printed here today — part 2 on 20th July).

Although the first meeting at Ingliston didn't take place until 1965, the idea of holding race meetings there first took root sometime prior to that. The showground was purchased by the Royal Highland and Agricultural Society in 1958, before which it had been a Golf Course. Because of that, it could perhaps be said that it was already used to "drivers", and Reg. Forrester-Smith has over the years probably been its most consistent "putter". The R.H.A.S. held the first permanent Highland Show at Ingliston in 1960 and shortly after that, an approach was made to them by David Murray and A. K. Stevenson who suggested forming a permanent racing circuit within the Showground. At the time, the idea was not received favourably but they did not give up and eventually a circuit was permitted, designed and constructed. The original Ingliston small circuit, extending to 0.76 of a mile, was open to the public, fittingly by A. K. Stevenson, in April, 1965. Much of the credit for the design of the circuit lies with lan Scott Watson who succeeded in getting the ideas for the circuit actually down on paper, while the practical, and sometimes seemingly impossible, job of translating fantasy to financial fact was very much the achievement of John Romanes, to whom the Ingliston ideal probably owes more than any other person. Ian also came up with an extremely ambitious plan to give Scotland its first circuit to reach international standard, situated within a complete motor sports centre. A look at the plan of this project shows that it incorporated the original small circuit and added to it a large loop stretching down past the Paddock and round a large portion of the Ingliston ground to the north of the circuit in what is now car parking and market area. It would have incorporated two potential club circuits which when joined together would have formed a national circuit extending to 1.87 miles with spectator facilities for 30,000 people and, in addition, a skid pan, driving tests arena and autocross circuit. Due to economic reasons and the difficulties which would have been presented in finding areas for spectators where they could see more than a small part of the circuit, the idea did not proceed any further, and ideas of a "Scottish Grand Prix have now faded forever.

The extension to the small circuit which includes the present hair-pin, was first used on 8th September, 1968. The line taken by this extension does not take in any area which had been proposed for the national circuit, for which, incidentally, the plans were drawn in 1966.

Although a meeting was held "behind closed doors" in late March, 1965 to try out the facilities at the new circuit, the first public meeting was on the 11th April of that year. The first race on that day was won by Ronnie Martin in a Lotus Elan R and second was none other than Andrew Cowan. Pole position on the grid for that race was held by Eric Liddell, who has the distinction of being the first person to knock a building down at Ingliston, having done so on the first lap. In spite of this, however, he was not the first person to crash at Ingliston, this having been Jimmy Veitch who got as far as the Esses on the first lap.

The first single seater race was won by Bill Stein, who later that day set the first outright lap record in 44.8 seconds, 60.0 m.p.h. This was achieved in an Ecosse Climax which had been built from a Cooper Monaco previously crashed by Jackie Stewart at Oulton Park. This car was run by Stein under the Ecurie Ecosse banner, and it also achieved the first 70 m.p.h. lap at Ingliston on 3rd October, 1965.

Over the 15 years of its existence, Ingliston has seen many drivers come and go, but also happily many drivers who came and stayed. A good few names have been with us at Ingliston since the very beginning, some of whom are still racing and some of whom have only recently retired. Taking into account two-part races, and races made up of heats and a final, a number of drivers have appeared in more than 100 races. By far the largest number is held by Bill Dryden, who has no less than 151 races to his credit in a variety of cars, of which more later. Next comes Kenny Allen, still one of Ingliston's foremost competitors who has to date driven in some 120 events. Reg Forrester-Smith, although never having won a race, has been in 112 races at Ingliston and in having done so must surely rank as a true example of the spirit of the club racing. Jimmy Dryden has appeared in 107 races, and an interesting fact is that all but 3 or 4 of these were in a Mini Cooper. Making up the "100 Club" are Dougal Niven (105), Andy Barton (102) and Tony Charnell, whose name appears in exactly 100 races. Only just failing to make it is Graham Birrell who has raced at Ingliston 98 times.

Acknowledgement, and appreciation, are due to the Scottish Motor Racing Encyclopaedia (alias Graham Gauld) for much mind bending matter, as also thanks to Jimmy Robertson for supplying the original idea. He can do the research next time!

No mean competitor himself, "Jimmy the Pink" has over 90 race meetings to his credit, his first having been in an Austin A40. He continues to entertain everyone today, and to him is dedicated one of the photographs above.

If you want to know who has won most races at Ingliston, who are the most successful drivers in the various classes, who achieved the first 80 p.m.h. lap (and other such useless information) you'll just have to wait for part 2 of this article on 20th July.
