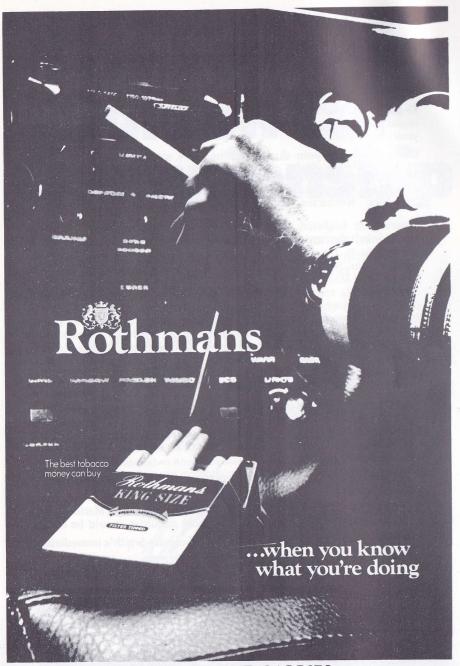

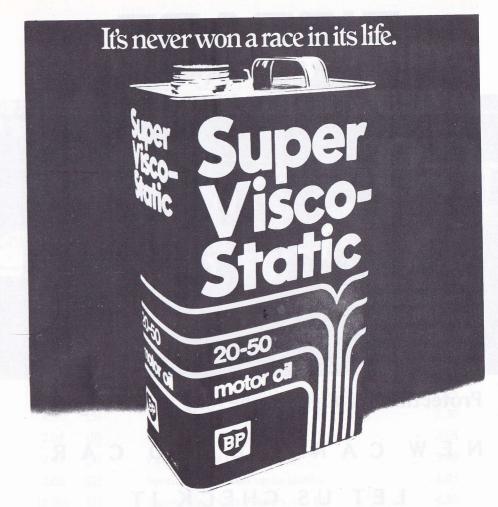

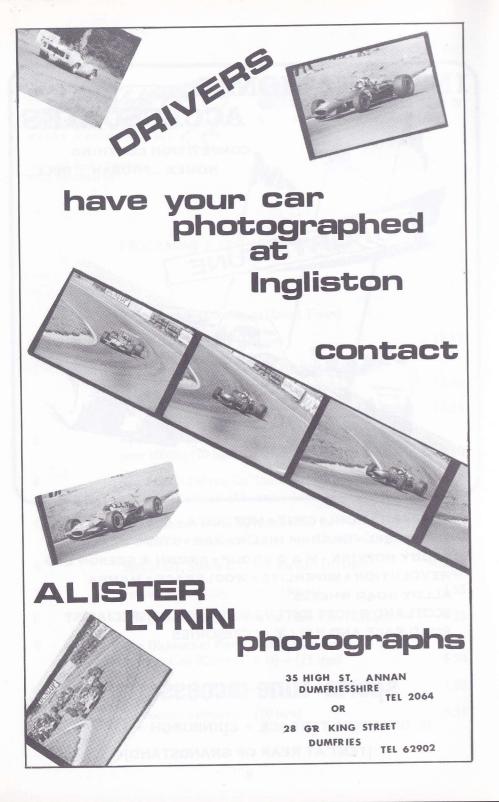

FOR YOUR DAY'S ENJOYMENT

Welcome back, Ladies and Gentlemen, to the Dickson's of Perth Trophy Race Meeting at Ingliston today (or yesterday if you happened to be here on Saturday for afternoon practice). Like our last Meeting in July, this Race Meeting is a "2-day" affair since Ingliston hosts a round of the National Castrol Anniversary Touring Car Championship this afternoon, a championship run by the R.A.C. with a total of thirteen rounds, twelve of them being on the southern circuits. But more about the Touring Cars later. This Meeting does, however, differ in one material respect from the July Race Meeting in that this is of National Status (i.e., only competitors who hold a National Competition Licence are eligible to compete and, accordingly, only the more experienced drivers will be seen this afternoon). With a National Championship round, the Meeting naturally just had to be National and, indeed, this is the only National Meeting presently scheduled at Ingliston this season (although we may surprise you later on in the year!).

As has been mentioned above, this weekend sees a "2-day" Race Meeting with practice for not only the Touring Cars but also Formula Fords and Special Saloons up to 1-litre being seen on the afternoon of Saturday, 17th August. The editor has, however, no earthly idea as to what sort of times spectators on the Saturday afternoon should be looking out for since the new Group 1 Touring Cars have never before raced on the Ingliston circuit. Nor are they, as it is later explained, strictly comparable with Production Saloon cars and accordingly no ready comparison is available. However, just to stick his neck out and to give you something to do with your stop watches on Saturday afternoon, the editor is going to have an uneducated guess that the fastest touring cars will be lapping (providing it is dry) at around 55/56 secs. Let's just wait and see how far out he actually is.

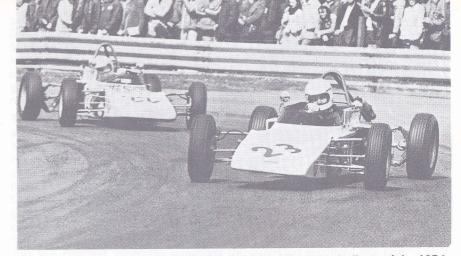
The Race Meeting proper is scheduled for Sunday with the first event of the day, for Modified Sports cars, "kicking off" at 12.15 pm. Without a shadow of a doubt the favourite for this race is John Absalom's Ginetta (55) which has proved itself almost unbeatable in Modified Sports car races at Ingliston so far this year. Although Ireland's Mike Nugent (59) pressed him hard at the beginning of the season, he was still 4½ secs. adrift at the last Race Meeting and not even the redoubtable Alec Souter (56) has been able to get his very fast Elan anywhere near the flying Northumbrian. The sensation of the Modified Sports car class, however, has been Ken Allen (79) with the Clan

Crusader so ably fielded last year by the 1973 Scottish single seater champion, Johnny Blades. Although Johnny bettered the Modified Sports Car class lap record on several occasions last year, Kenny has gone one better this year by bettering that record on (the editor stands to be corrected as usual) every Ingliston outing this year, the current lap record of 55.2 secs. having been set up by him in last Meeting's race. Indeed, so potent is the 998 cc Crusader that one almost equates it with the higher capacity cars, since it has so far dominated the up to 1150 cc class so thoroughly that the other cars have had no chance of even keeping it in sight!

Immediately following the Modsports is the first heat of the Special Saloon Race (for cars up to 1000 cc) and, as always, the out-and-out favourite is none other than your actual heavy goods vehicle driver from Haltwhistle, Sedric Bell with his Allen 16-valve engined Mini (111). Sedric has, like John Absalom in the Modsport class, been the dominating factor of the smaller capacitated saloons this season although the great question mark is when (if ever!) John Fyda (122) will manage to finish the race with his Agra Imp. John has shown that the car has the potential to keep up with Sedric but, so far, mechanical problems have forced him to retire from every race. Scotland's honour has, accordingly, been left to Peter Pitman (114) and lan Forrest (112). Following the luncheon interval comes the race for the big saloons with a tripartite battle almost certain between the Vauxhalls of S.M.T's Bill Dryden (89), Dealer Team Vauxhall's Gerry Marshall (97) and the Ford Boss Escort of Border Reivers' driver, Dougal Niven (90). With very little in it at the top of the Lombard North Central Scottish Saloon Car Championship, both Bill and Dougal will be determined to score the maximum points this afternoon and Vauxhall, having this in mind, have sent up the amazing "now you see me, now you see me sideways" Gerry Marshall to try to make certain that Ford do not score too many of them! On the other hand, if Gerry goes too well, he could reduce Bill Dryden's chances - a somewhat tricky nicety since Gerry has also registered for the Lombard Championship and will be keen to score points for himself! Having piloted his Firenza into second place in last Meeting's Super Saloon car event, Gerry, who is not a man to accept a mere second place lightly, will be determined to turn that into a first this afternoon and we should expect to see fireworks amongst the leading cars. Improving steadily as the season progresses, too, is Milngavie's Frank Gunn (91) with his BDA powered Ford Escort. In the 1300 cc class, Jim Dryden (101) and the incredibly potent Mini 1275 GT of Eric Smith (104)

resume their season long battle.

The Meeting proceeds with the Eastford Motor Co. Ltd. Trophy Race, very aptly for Formula Ford Cars. Once again a magnificent entry of Formula Fords was received but, while there were far too many for one race, there were just not quite enough for two and accordingly several drivers have regrettably had to be disappointed. The result, however, is that the cream of the Formula Fords are assembled for this race with the four favourites including Norman Dickson (22) with his Van Diemen RF74. Norman is, of course, the son of Tommy Dickson, the Managing Director of Dickson's of Perth (today's Race Meeting sponsors) and doubtless Norman will be determined to repeat his 1973 performance (when he won the Formula Ford race at the Dickson's of Perth Meeting). Norman has, however, International grade competition in the form of South African Formula Ford Champion, Kenny Gray, with his Van Diemen (23). With his win at the July Meeting, Kenny rocketed into the lead of the Rothmans Championship for Formula Ford cars and, with his natural driving ability, he will almost certainly be a hard man to overtake. The previous leader, Kirkliston's Stu Lawson (25) will be determined to do just that in his Hawke Scholar DL11 while Dumfries driver Grahame Hamilton (49) can be counted on to be in there mixing it as well. Throw in a few more of the other Ingliston regulars (such as John MacGilvray (24) and Andrew Jeffrey (30)) and you have all the makings of yet another tense Formula Ford battle.

And speaking of Formula Fords, there has been a certain amount of controversy recently about the eligibility of Formula Fords at Ingliston. These cars are, as spectators may be aware, constructed to very tight specifications and the whole idea of the class is to restrict modification to such an extent that all the competitors have (in theory at least) an equal chance. Because of the strictness of the regulations governing the vehicles, however, it is extremely easy to "bend" an engine (indeed, it is a relatively simple matter to purchase or drive a car with a "bent motor" without even realising it!). Although very simple to bend the Rules, it is not quite so easy to ensure that they are being kept! Specially trained Scrutineers are required to determine whether an engine is legal or not and, regrettably, Scotland does not as yet have its own eligibility scrutineer (although we are hopeful of having one for 1975). To try to make certain that no-one is charging round with the proverbial 1900cc Formula Ford, the promoters are inviting one of the R.A.C's team of eligibility scrutineers up to Ingliston for at least one of our remaining Meetings and, accordingly, at either

this or one of the forthcoming Race Meetings spectators may suddenly find two of the cars being whipped off the track after the race to have their engines stripped! Suffice it to say that it is an extremely sad state of affairs to find that one has to laboriously strip engines and meticulously measure and weigh the parts to determine who is going by the Rules and who isn't — whatever has happened to sportsmanship?

The first of the two Dickson's of Perth Trophy races for Touring Cars follows the Formula Fords at 3 o'clock and this features 4 hairy Chevy Camaros along with a brood of 3-litre Capris etc. (as to which more later). Event 6 is for Special GT, Sports and Clubmans cars with the almost certain winner being Tony Charnell in the Lola Ford (62). Tony has completely dominated the Sports car class this season and a win this afternoon would almost certainly clinch the Hartley Whyte Championship for him. However, improving steadily as the new 1500 cc mill is slowly sorted out, is Ed Labinjoh's Fisher Spyder (66) which surprised everyone in July by appearing on pole position of the grid for the GT race. Sadly, the car did not go much further than that but, once Jack Fisher has ironed out all the bugs, this car could give Tony Charnell something to worry about. Another car which has suddenly seemed to find its niche is the Mallock U2 of S.M.R.C. Chairman, Alastair Mackintosh (80). Although originally a Formula Ford car, Alastair has converted this to super-sports trim and the conversation, albeit expensive, has proved to be Alastair's upjump (if that is the opposite of downfall!) since Alastair has suddenly come into his own in the sports car events. His Clubmans opposition, however, will almost certainly come from the Mallocks of Iim Bairs (65) and Peter MacNaughton (61) and the Gryphons of Jack Hugh (63) and Roy MacNab (67). Following the sports cars, back to Special Saloons with the Lombard North Central final. For those of you not familiar with the Ingliston system of heats and a final the method of ascertaining the grid for this race is simple. The fastest five finishing in each class from events 2 and 3 together with the next fastest car irrespective of class all go forward to this race to battle for points in the coveted Lombard North Central Championship. Although a pre-requisite of competition in this event is that the driver must finish his heat, occasionally cars which do not finish the earlier heat are allowed to compete providing no other eligible competitor is available to take the place on the grid. However, should this happen, the car allowed so to compete is not eligible for prize money or Championship points. One thing is certain, however, and that is that Doug Niven will be trying every trick he knows to throw his 5.7-litre Escort around the circuit in the fastest time vet

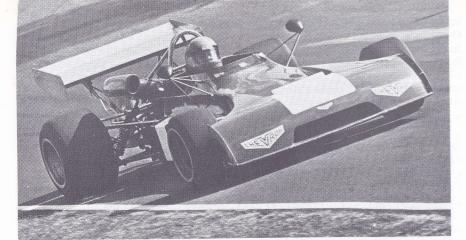
achieved by him. The previous lap record holder (with a lap of 52.7 secs.), Doug could only get his lap times down to 52.6 in practice for last Meeting's Super Saloon race, a time equal to Mick Hill's practice time. In the race itself, however, Mick produced that extra little something to take a new lap record of 52.5 secs., an average speed of 70.63 m.p.h. Not one to see his lap record going by the board without a struggle, Dougal will be determined to see his name back in the Programme on page 3 for September!

The Burmah Trophy Race for Libre cars follows the Special Saloon Car Final at 4.25 and sees a 15 lap battle scheduled between the Formula 2 Rondel Motul M1 of Iain McLaren (1) and Tony Charnell's ex-Graham Hill Brabham Ford (2). Ex-1-litre Mini star, Andy Barton, returns to the circuit with the car which won the 1973 Scottish Libre Championship, the ex-Emmerson Fittipaldi Lotus 69F2 (5). One interesting newcomer for this race is Nigel Clarkson (3) who fields the first Production Formula Atlantic Lola (a Lola T360) seen in this Country and it will be interesting to note how this car performs against the other regular Atlantics, especially that of the current Scottish Hillclimb Championship leader, Doug Thomson (9). Spectators in July will, however, especially remember the somewhat peculiar Libre race when Jain McLaren shattered everyone by charging off the grid into a first lap lead. Doug Thomson, on the other hand, shattered both himself and Tommy Reid (7) by driving right over the top of the latter driver on the grid, much to Tommy's consternation and Doug's initial pleasure (since he effectively leapfrogged Tommy to get in front of him!). Doug's excitement was short lived, however, since he had to retire shortly afterwards while Tommy, in his effort to come back to grips with Iain McLaren, did a silly just past the Hairpin and put himself right back down the field. With Iain McLaren in a comfortable lead, and Tony Charnell motoring solidly around in second place, the feature of that race was the incredible drive put up by Tommy Reid in charging through the field to regain second place prior to the chequered flag. Notwithstanding that fine drive, however, much of the kudos for that race must go to lain McLaren who has long deserved a Libre win and who, paradoxically, eventually notched this up with some-one else's car, he having had to borrow Campbell Graham's Chevron for that race. Iain is back with his Rondel Motul this afternoon, the engine having been completely rebuilt, and he could accordingly repeat his July success today.

Event 9 sees the second of the Dickson's of Perth Trophy Races for Touring cars and, again, more about this race is said later. Suffice it to say at the minute that almost certainly the main centre of attraction before this race will be the two



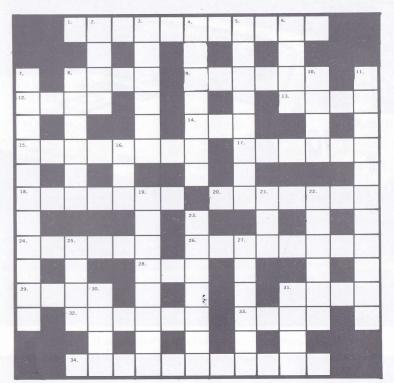
Ted Dzierzek's immaculately prepared Hawke Atlantic

Penthouse Pets lending "support" (that can't be right, can it?) to Wendy Markey on the grid. Just what they will be doing to the other competitors has not been made absolutely clear on the entry forms! Once the dust has settled from the second Dickson's of Perth Trophy race, however, and the Trophies have been duly presented, we move onto the final race of the day for Production Saloon cars. Although a class which took its own time to get off the ground at Ingliston, Production Saloons have recently been coming into their own. In October of last year, for example, we were treated to a fantastic Production Saloon car race and, again in May, very much the same thing happened. However, July's Production race must have been one of the best races ever seen at Ingliston, with three cars battling for the lead for the entire ten lap race. The eventual winner, and driver voted "Man of the Meeting" by BP, was Jenny Birrell Esq. (well, it is consistent with what BP called her) in the S.M.T. Magnum (143). For the entire race, however, lenny was fighting off, firstly, her husband Graham Birrell with the Halesfield Motors' Hunter GLS (144) and, latterly, Ed Labinjoh's Alfa Romeo 2000 GTV (148). Although Ed was able to take Graham Birrell after the first few laps of the race, everything he could pull out of the hat was insufficient to sneak the Alfa past the flying Magnum and he had to content himself with second place last time round. These three cars, however, could have been covered by a handkerchief for the entire race and the feast of sideways motoring and "cut and thrust" racing that they provided made the Production Saloon Car race the event of the day in July. Just to make it even more exciting today, Mike Leeke of Halesfield Motors has arranged for Bernard Unett to drive another Hunter (147) and, with such high powered Gp. 1 material at the wheel, this could give the leading drivers vet another headache, as could John Hanley's 2-litre Opel Ascona (149). One driver very often forgotten is Bob Leckie in the Hillman Avenger GT (138) driving in a smaller capacity class, Bob has consistently put his Avenger amongst the leaders and he currently leads the Ziebart Championship for Production Saloons jointly with Ed Labinjoh and Ian Smith (132).

That's it then, the end of another Ingliston Race Meeting and yet another long (and, we hope, hot) weekend of motor sport. Don't forget that our next Race Meeting is scheduled for Sunday 15th September when we hope to be welcoming you all back again for another day's motor sport. Certainly, by then, the local championships will be really hotting up and, with over £3,000 worth of championship prize money at stake, there will be every inducement for the drivers to go flat out in September. Hoping to see you then, then!

Sponsoring today's main race at Ingliston are Dickson Motors of Perth, the garage organisation which is known to motor racing enthusiasts everywhere.

Tommy Dickson, the Company's managing director, is Scotland's Motor Man. In 1959 he was Scottish Motor Racing Champion and a year later he was British Sports Car Champion. In 1962 he was No. 1 driver in the Ecurie Ecosse team. At this stage Tommy Dickson decided to retire from motor racing to concentrate on his business. Today he is the Saab distributor for Scotland and has the main agency for Mercedes-Benz.

Not surprisingly, however, Tommy Dickson's interest in motor racing has remained constant. His son, Norman, is racing today, and has had terrific success in his first two years of motor racing. Indeed, in 1973, Norman won the Formula Ford race at the last Dicksons of Perth Trophy Race Meeting.

Another of Tommy Dickson's interests is his private helicopter which he pilots both for business and pleasure and he is expected to drop in to supervise todays proceedings by air.



THE CASTROL ANNIVERSARY TOURING CAR CHAMPIONSHIP 1974

What then, we hear you ask, is a Castrol Anniversary Touring car? A good question but one somewhat difficult to answer shortly. The anniversary part is easy — this is Castrol's 75th anniversary. The "Castrol" is simple too, Castrol being the sponsors of the 1974 Touring Car Championship. The difficult bit is the explanation of what a "touring car" is. Last year it was easy — it was an FIA Gp. 2 car and spectators at the 1973 August Race Meeting at Ingliston will recall the fantastic battle between the incredible Camaro of Frank Gardner, the Broadspeed Escort of Andy Rouse and the diminutive Datson of the only man ever to sign-on upside down at Ingliston, Mashiro Hesemi. 1973 was, however, the last year of the Gp. 2 touring cars, the final years of that class having been marred by commercial concerns pouring vast quantities of money into relatively few cars thereby making them much more competitive than their "poorer" relations. For 1974, therefore, it was decided to try to revamp the touring cars Regs with a view to making the class as competitive as possible.

The eventual decision was to go "Gp. 1", that is, to model the cars racing in the Championship as closely as possible on those which could be bought straight out of a showroom. Gp. 1 racing is, in fact, for Production Saloon cars and, as such, is remarkably similar to the Production saloon racing normally seen at Ingliston. The theory is that, if all the cars are of basically the same mechanical standard, the outcome of each race will depend entirely upon drivers' skill and the racing should accordingly be all the more exciting. As is normal whenever changes are suggested to a class, however, the outcry which followed the suggestion of the introduction of a Gp. 1 Touring Car Championship in 1974 saw gradual modifications being built into the Regulations until, once the dust settled, the new Touring Car Regs were as much "Gp. 1" as fly in the air! Indeed, no sooner had the final Regs been announced, than the new Gp. 1 (FIA Regulations) was being referred to as Gp. 11/2! Be that as it may, the new cars are extremely competitive and, in fact, very many of the competitors feel that the position has now been returned to the early days of Gp. 2 when that class of saloon car racing was at its height in Gt. Britain. And if any of you reckon that the Gp. 11/2 "Production Saloons" are likely to be slow, the fastest Chevrolet Camaros are lapping Silverstone merely 2 secs. slower than the original



Gp. 2 Camaros did — bearing in mind that the fastest saloon car lap ever driven at Ingliston was by Frank Gardner in his Chevrolet Camaro during practice for the Gp. 2 race last August (with a time of 51.2 secs., almost 1½ secs. faster than the "new" Special Saloon Car lap record set up by "Super Saloon" Mick Hill at the last InglistonMeeting) and that the Gp. 1½ boys reckon that there will be very little difference in the speed of last year's Gp. 2 cars and this year's Touring Cars around Ingliston, you might get the feeling that we are in for a whale of a race this afternoon.

Having explained (vaguely at least) what a touring car is, let us proceed to explain the classes which are competing. The Championship itself is divided into four separate classes — Class A (cars over 4 litres), Class B (cars over 2.5 litres up to 4 litres), Class C (cars over 1.6 litres up to 2.5 litres) and Class D (cars up to 1600 cc). To help members of the public identify which car is racing in which class, the regulations have specified that the roof panels of every competing car must be marked with a stripe of a minimum width of 18" running fore to aft in the following colours:— Class A — Castrol red, Class B — RAC blue, Class C — Castrol green and Class D — white. Accordingly, spectators should remember during the afternoon that cars with a similar roof "stripe" are racing against each other for class points. Indeed, the whole Championship is based on a class scoring system, the points being awarded to the leading cars home in each class rather than on the overall results.

And having talked about championship scoring, how are the competitors placed to date in the 1974 Touring Car Championship. The last round of the Championship was held as one of the supporting races to the British Grand Prix on Saturday, 20th July and (assuming that various appeals lodged against disqualifications are upheld) the Championship table after that event was as follows:—

The 25 lap race for Touring cars over 2.5 litres (don't forget the colour coding is a red roof stripe for cars over 4 litres and a blue roof stripe for cars between 2501 — 4000 cc) sees a host of 6-litre Chevrolet Camaros battling (or blundering) their way around the Ingliston circuit and, as the much quoted Motoring News says, "it doesn't take a crystal ball to predict that the front row of the grid will be all Chevrolet Camaro. The 4-litre class again sees the tripartite battle between Opel, Ford and BMW. It did look as though Peter Hanson's Commodore CSE was running away with the class, but then at Thruxton Tom Walkinshaw went exceptionally well in the Borham prepared Capri. We are told, that, following further development, the Ford should now be able to match the Opel's performance, and Tony Lanfranchi's BMW CSI won't be hanging about either, now they have rid themselves of the troublesome Rowland engines".

So much for Motoring News! At the last Touring car round at Brands Hatch, however, it was Stuart Graham who completely dominated the event, picking off Dick Lloyd's Camaro halfway through the race and romping home a full minute in front. Immediately behind Lloyd, however, was Tom Walkinshaw's 3-litre Capri and, knowing Ingliston as he does (Tom was the Scottish Formula Ford Champion back in '70) he could well give the heavier machinery a shock today, providing he can get his nose out in front at the very start. As we said, familiarity with the circuit will almost certainly be a telling factor and, accordingly, anyone who has raced regularly at the Ingliston circuit could have a distinct advantage. One man who has raced here with considerable success in the past is none other than your actual Brian (Yogi) Muir who has been entered in a previous Touring Car event in the Martin Thomas Camaro. Should his name manage to find its way into the list for today's race we can expect the established order of things to date to be upset considerably. Don't forget either one erstwhile Ingliston regular in the shape of ex-modsport type, Jon Fletcher, who used to give John Absalom a run for his money in the good old days with his Elan. Kitted out with a 6-litre Chevy Camaro this afternoon heaven only knows what Jon will be able to do!

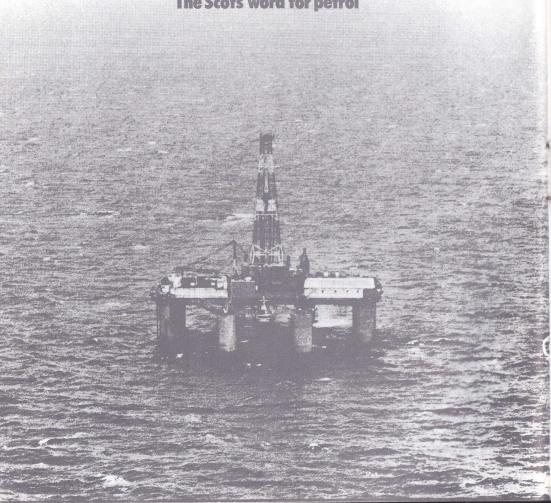

The second of the two Castrol Anniversary Challenge races this afternoon is for Touring Cars up to 2500 cc (don't forget, those with the green roof stripes are 1601 - 2500 cc and those with the white stripes, up to 1600 cc). While a circuit of curves itself, Ingliston has nothing on the curves likely to be draped around the grid this afternoon since, with Penthouse International sponsoring Wendy Markey's Mazda, the entrants are sending up two of the famous Penthouse Pets to glamorise the grid. While admitting a fleeting familiarity with the outline of Penthouse Pets (!) the editor certainly has no idea what the form is for Castrol Touring Cars and, accordingly, he can do no worse than to quote yet again from the Motoring News Preview of the last Gp. 1 race at Brands Hatch in July!

"The fiercest fighting, and the most sideways cornering, has so far come from the 2500 cc class. Barrie Williams' Mazda and John Lyon's Alfa Romeo once more take on a bevy of Triumph Dolomite Sprints led by the Broadspeed Cars of Andy Rouse and Tony Dron, and John Hine's Bill Shaw version. It is the 1600s though, that have brought back 3-abreast cornering of the sort that originally made Minis so popular with the crowds. Stan Clark leads the class in the Championship, but his Alfa Romeo invariably has enormous battles with the Hillman Avenger GTs of Bernard Unett, Roger Bell and Simon Kirkby."

Having said that the editor knows nothing whatsoever about Gp. 1 racing, let him now merely stick his neck out by suggesting that one of the most telling factors in this afternoon's Touring car events will almost certainly be familiarity with the circuit. Those who know their way around Ingliston will have a distinct advantage over those who do not. And one man who certainly knows his way around is Andy Rouse with the Broadspeed prepared Triumph Dolomite Sprint, Andy having powered the Broadspeed Escort RS around Ingliston in practice for last year's Gp. 2 event in a shattering 52.2 secs., 0.3 secs. quicker than the newly established Special Saloon Car record. Not to be outdone, and also knowing their way around Ingliston remarkably well, are the Hillman Avenger GTs of Jenny Birrell and Bernard Unett while, far from the most diminutive of drivers, Gerry Marshall returns with his Gp. 1 Magnum after his spectacular Super Saloon race in July.

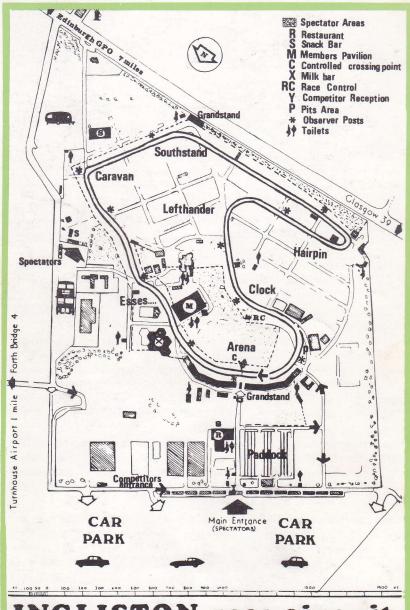
