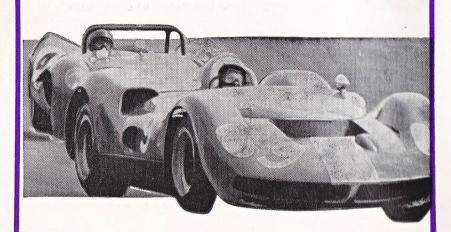

A word from our promoters

It is particularly fitting that the main race at the first meeting at the extended Ingliston should be the "Jock McBain Memorial Trophy" Race-and it is more than ever appropriate this year. The late Jock McBain was the founder and "Patron" of the Border Reivers Motor Racing Syndicate. No mean driver himself, he would, had not the 1939/45 war intervened at the age he would have normally started motor racing, have in all probability become one of Scotland's select band of Formula One drivers. But instead Jock elected to resuscitate the team in 1958-along with Ian Scott Watson-to give Jim Clark his break into motor racing. It was Jock who introduced Jim to Reg Parnell and negotiated a works drive for the famous Aston-Martin team and although their initiation into Formula One proved abortive it nevertheless led to Border Reivers receiving full works backing at Le Mans where, with Roy Salvadori as co-driver, the Reivers chalked up 3rd place in 1960. Jock's links with our club go much further back than Jim Clark, though. He was largely responsible for starting motor racing in Scotland, first at Winfield and later at Charterhall, as Chairman of the Winfield Joint Committeee. Later-after relinquishing this post-he persuaded lan Scott Watson to help him found the Border Motor Racing Club and this was the principal parent of the present Scottish Motor Racng Club now fully established with over 2,000 members as one of the leading clubs in the U.K.

Jock died suddenly after a fairly short illness at the age of 50 just one year to the day before Jim Clark won his first World Championship and it was Jim's one great regret that his patron should not have been able to share this success. Instead, Jim Clark-when Ingliston started -presented the Club with the beautiful trophy which bears memory to one of the great men of Scottish motor sport. Now Jim is gone too and this brings special poignancy to this meeting, for Jim Clark's trustees are principal shareholders in Scotcircuits Ltd.

Today's meeting brings fulfilment of an ambition by all of the shareholders in the company for we now feel that Ingliston has found the answer to the only valid criticisms levelled at it in the past. We feel sure that the racing will be greatly enhanced by the extension, and would like to extend our special thanks to the Royal Highland and Agricultural Society for permititing us to construct the extension and to Wimpeys Ltd., the main contractors, and Estate Road Development Co. Ltd., their sub-contractors, for the earh-moving and other nonsurfacing work, for the excellence of their work and the speed with which they have carried it out. May we be blessed with good weather and excellent racing.

For your Day's Enjoyment ...

Welcome to this the Edinburgh Festival Race Meeting at Ingliston, the first meeting to be run on the new extended Ingliston circuit and a day when a whole new set of race records will be filed away in the record book.

As usual the entry for the meeting has been large though a number of the better known English competitors will not be around. The main race of the day will be the Formula Libre event for the Jock McBain Memorial Trophy and this will be all one race not, as normally, two heats with the aggregate times counting.

The McBain Trophy race has always been one of the best on the calendar and this time there is the added touch of interest with the new lengthened circuit. Work was completed only recently and none of the competitors have been able to get any pre-race practice until this morning.

Scotland's terrible trio, Willie Forbes, Bifl Dryden and Andrew Fletcher will be out to decide once and for all who is the quickest round the circuit because there is little between them. Willie, with his bright yellow Lotus-B.M.W., currently leads the Championship for the Callands Trophy but Bill Dryden has improved with every meeting and don't be surpised if he forces the white arrowhead on his blue Brabham BT21A right through to the front and so make the next and final meeting in October a decisive one. For Andrew Fletcher it has been a grisly year with all sorts of mechanical trouble. His chances of winning the Formula Libre championship, as he did last year, are slim but he could seriously affect the final positions.

Missing from the last meeting was **John Millar** from Bridge of Weir but he has been working on his 2-litre Brabham-B.M.W. and could well spring a surprise particularly as the extra bit of straight will give the faster cars the advantage. Dark horse, however, is **Howard Heerey** with his Chevron. Heerey has been seen driving a number of cars at Ingliston and though he is only in a 1,000cc F3 racer he might well surprise everyone, particularly if the circuit is wet. Another dark horse is **Tony Charnell** with his Lola T55 which was given a covering of amusing labels at the last meeting. Tony has had more success with his ex-Midland Racing car this year than last.

Mike Butcher's attractive Haggispeed-Ford will again be at the circuit as will Ronnie MacGillivray's ex-Fletcher Brabham and Ronnie Mackay's ex-Millar Brabham. Richard Scott will have his Lotus 41 and completing the field will be the Derek Braid Merlyn driven by lan Cockrane. At the last meeting Derek drove the car himself but one assumes lan will be back at the wheel this time.

A late entrant for the Jock McBain race was **Tommy Reid** from Belfast with his Brabham-Ford and he could upset a few peoples' chances.

The Special G.T. cars this meeting are a mixed bunch with John Nicholson the man to watch with his Jaynick G.T. John is leading the field in the Sheila Whyte Tankard competition for G.T. cars and he will again be facing George Silverwood's Mercury G.T. and Edward Labinjoh's Fisher G.T. The danger man in this race is John Calvert, whom we haven't seen at Ingliston for some time. John used to have a Lotus Elan but he now drives a Lotus 47 Europa and has had it rebuilt since his spectacular crash at Silverstone earlier in the year.

Rea Forester Smith has his Lotus G.T. and we note he calls it the O.A.P. G.T. Are we to assume the letters mean Old Age Pensioner? John Milne will be flying back from holiday to compete with his Jacobs-style M.G. Midget, but he has reason to speed back because his old team leader in B.M.C. rallying days, John Gott, is also taking part at the meeting. John Gott, Chief Constable of Northants, is rated "Top Cop" in the racing business and as a Competitions Committee member of the R.A.C. he is highly respected for his skill in administration. He is in Scotland just now lecturing on a police course at Tullieallan and was persuaded to enter his ex-factory Austin Healey 3000 in the marque race. John is at present leading the Amasco Marque Championship with this car and also taking part in the Marque class will be lan Hall who was the 1967 Austin Healey Club Champion. Tommy Thomson's E Type Jaguar will be out again as will Bill Dryden in the H. & G. Robinson Honda which won the marque race at the last meeting. It will be interesting to see how the car fares on the new straight.

In the saloon car classes there are the regular names, the **Birrell** brothers and **Logan Morrison** and for the third time this season Don Moore has decided to bring his fast racing Mini-Cooper for **John Handley** to drive. Handley and Moore feel that Ingliston is one of their favourite circuits; maybe it's all these high placings they get!

Jim Dryden, the most unlucky man in saloon car racing this season will again be trying his luck and Bill Borrowman has had his Mini Cooper patched up after his last lap scramble with Davey Muter at the last meeting. We hear Borrowman has found an extra 500 r.p.m. by fitting a new rev-counter!

Probably the most interesting entry is in the Formula Ford race where **Dave Walker** with the official Jim Russell Racing Russell-Alexis will be out to repeat his performance at the July meeting when he won the Ingliston F.F. race. **Richard Mallock** is running his U2 again but the man to watch here is **Mo Harness** from Spilsby in his Russell-Alexis who has had five first and six seconds in Formula Ford so far this year. Then there is **John Elliot** with his Merlyn and the American driver **Hal Folts** with a Nike. All of them compete against our own Scots like **Harry Glibert** who is well placed in the National Lotus contest, **Gerry Birrell** with the Centro-Scot Lotus, **Ted Clark** in the orange Lotus 51 and **Brian Squires** in another Lotus 51.

The up to 1,000cc saloons are led by Logan Morrison with his Chamois and backing him up are Bob Haining, George Douglas and Jim Howden with their Imps/Chamois. Up from Ealing in London is Nick Waterhouse with a Mini-Cooper and the Mini 7 Club Champion for 1966/67 Bob Fox in his Wesley Mini.

All told an action packed programme with the added mystery of who is going to end the afternoon with a lap record under their belt as all the class records are up for grabs at this meeting; and they are a hungry bunch going after them.

None of the drivers today have ever had a chance to drive on the new extension. To leave the contractors every chance to complete the works unhindered, Scotcircuits had to cancel all club and private practice bookings from 4th August until today. Everyone will thus have equal opporunity of acquainting themselves with the new road. The next Club Practice Day is fully booked already with members wishing to find out for themselves what it is like trying to stop for the new hairpin!

Many racegoers are enthusiastic photographers or cine-photographers and it could be that you will run out of film if it is a sunny day with the usual amount of excitement. Reg Forester-Smith will be pleased to sell you photographic goods from his shop behind the Highland Grandstand. He also takes photographs at every meeting and you may wish to purchase photographs of your favourite drivers or cars.



There is always a fascination for motor accessories and a demand for the necessities of racing — goggles, racing overalls, stopwatches, etc. These can be obtained from Graham Birrell's mobile shop just opposite the Forester-Smith shop behind the grandstand.



A well-sheltered field and a triendly farmer is all that is required for a perfect "take-off."

Quite a lot of activity happens throughout the day and some of this may seem strange to the newcomer. All motor sport in Britain is strictly controlled by the Motor Sport Division of the R.A.C. and the controls are aimed at making the sport just as safe as is possible. Responsible for making sure that the meeting runs to schedule and runs according to the regulations is the Clerk of Course, whom you will see driving round the circuit between races in a car carrying a white flag, checking that everything is in order for the next event.. His "nerve-centre" is the Race Control Building in the Central Enclosure (the rather splendid glass box below the clock-mast), where he keeps in touch by telephone throughout the day with all the points around the circuit. The track is divided into sectors, each under the control of an Observer, and each equipped with a telephone. The observer has with him a number of different marshals; some of these are respon-

sible for keeping the track clear for racing and for undertaking rescue operations in the event of an accident, others for signalling to drivers by means of recognised flags to warn them of dangers or let them know that a car behind wishes to overtake. The Yellow Flag is used as a warning in the event of an incident ahead; the yellow and red striped flag indicates the presence of oil on the circuit's surface; the blue flag is used to indicate—when held stationary—the presence of a car close behind, and when waved the fact that a car is attempting to overtake. If you are in the main grandstand you may also see a black flag displayed with a number on a board; this is a signal to the car bearing that number that he must return to the pits on his next lap and it usually indicates either a fault in the car which is visible to the observers but perhaps not apparent to the driver or that the driver has committed some infringement of regulations.

* * *

You may wonder where to get grandstand seats. These are available—or at least all those which have not been sold in advance—from a kiosk immediately behind the Crossing Point to the Central Enclosure in the centre of the main grandstand, with the exception of those for the Shepherds' Grandstand, which are available from a kiosk in the East Gate Courtyard. Prices for all tickets are 10/-, except for those in the East Wing of the Highland Stand which are 5/-.

Programmes are available from three different kiosks. One at the Main North Gate, one behind the main grandstand and one in the East Gate Courtyard (where the Shepherds' Grandstand tickets are sold).

The New Circuit

The lengthening of the Ingliston circuit has been a subject of speculation for a long time; indeed since the circuit opened in 1965. It was something realised by Scotcircuits, who promote motor racing at Ingliston, long before the first meeting, and now the new extension has come into being. How will it change racing at Ingliston is hard to say at this juncture. It will certainly add between 12-20 seconds on to the lap times depending on the cars and will give much more room for overtaking along the new top straight. On the other hand the hairpin at the end of this straight is really tight and this might well be the key corner on the circuit. Time will tell.

Ingliston as a circuit was first thought of when the Royal Highland Society first purchased the land around Ingliston House, formerly a golf course, as a permanent site for the Royal Highland Show. At that time, when preliminary plans were being drawn up as to the siting of perimeter roads and linking roads for the showground, the suggestion was made to incorporate a motor racing circuit. This was dismissed at the time as the Royal Highland Society had too many other things on their mind but after a few kart meetings had been held on some of the little link roads it was put forward that with a few modifications a racing circuit could be developed. Obviously the Royal Highland Society didn't have the technical know-how to develop a plan and finance the actual construction of the circuit. Amongst the founders was the late Jim Clark and many of the best known Scottish motor racing enthusiasts were involved, particularly members of the Scottish Motor Racing Club. This nucleus, then, developed the circuit as we see it today. The initial idea was to incorporate a loop similar to the one we see inaugurated today but to keep the initial plans simple a compromise short circuit was designed and built; the circuit we know so well.

This caused the disappearance of an athletic track which was designed into the original Highland Show complex because this hadn't been successful and soon the bulldozers arrived to carve out the esses and the various corners. Surprisingly little work was needed to convert the existing roads to a circuit and the resultant track was given R.A.C. blessing and the first meetings took place.

As long ago as two years ago an alternative plan was on paper to loop the circuit northwards at the end of the main stand and sprint down towards the present Herdsman's Resturant, round the Car Park, and then back to meet the esses, and in fact after a little bit of mistaken identity the rough plans for this were published in error by the R.A.C. in their Year Book to the consternation of all involved—not least the drivers who knew this extension didn't even exist - This was all sorted out, but the problems of extending the circuit still remained, and this year it was decided to continue the top straight and bring the circuit length up to just over a mile to the lap.

Most drivers today will be feeling their way around the new part and whereas the hairpin will provide specific problems of slowing from possibly 120 m.p.h. to a crawl the left hander which brings the cars back on ot the small circuit is sure to cause a lot of experimentation in lines, and I for one wouldn't pay too much attention to lap times at this meeting. They will provide a guide, it is true, but once the drivers have found the quickest way and the proper gear ratios for the new complexities of the circuit Ingliston is going to be a much more interesting racing circuit to watch.

Flying on Hot Air

Hot air is the principle of the oldest successful flying machine. The first ascent was made from Paris in 1783 by the Montolfrier balloon, and the first ascent in the United Kingdom was made from Edinburgh in a hot air balloon in 1784.

The modern hot air balloon works on the old principle, but makes full use in its construction of modern technology. It was conceived in the U.S.A. about five years ago. The envelope is made from nylon, or other man made fibre, and the heat is provided by a burner which consumes propane from cylinder in the basket.

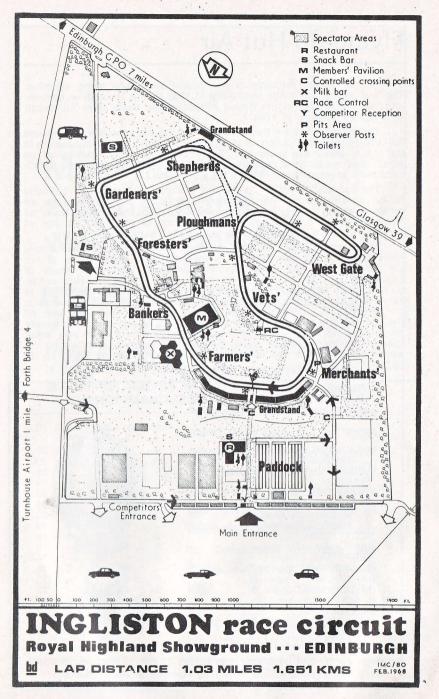
The balloon "G-AVTL" is the first of these modern hot air balloons to be constructed in this country. Its building was arranged by an amateur group (most of whose members had some experience of "heavier-than-air" flying). The actual sewing of the 1400 sq. yds. of material to make the envelope was done at a parachute factory.

A balloon cannot be driven in any horizontal direction, but simply drifts at the speed and direction of the wind. The modern type of hot air balloon can be controlled more precisely than other types of balloon in altitude, however, and it provides a form of flying sensation different from any other type of aircraft. It is possible to fly at very low altitude, and of course, a very low speed. When the burner is off (about 70% of the time) the balloon is completely silent and all the sounds from the earth come floating up—it is easy to talk to people on the ground. The balloon can be manoeuvred to land in very small spaces, provided that they are in the downwind path determined by the wind. Although low altitude flight is most interesting, flight up to 20,000 ft. is possible.
