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The Kings Cup F.F. Championship

A BACKGROUND TO THE TROPHY'S SPONSORS

KINGS & CO LTD. was formed in 1899 when a small Company known as Robert King of Burnhouse, Beith, Ayrshire, was bought by James Nicholl Cuthbert and one or two of his associates. They traded as Quarrymasters and Contractors mainly in Ayrshire until the start of the first World War when the business was further expanded to include the felling and cutting of timber in the North of Scotland. However, by the early 1920's the road work was demanding much more capital and personal supervision, and so the timber mills were disbanded and by 1924 the first major road contract was won. This was for the reconstruction of the roadway system in Skye, and the value of the contract was about £100,000. It was here that the Company first moved away from steam-waggons to petrol-driven ones, but, however it was not until 1944 that the last of the steam Fodens left the roads.

From 1927, when the Borders branch was added, first at St. Boswells and later at Earlston, until 1939, many changes took place and numerous permanent Quarries with modern crushing plants were opened mainly

to assist the contracting side of the business.

The second World War saw great activity on aerodrome runways, supply depots, Army camps and anti-tank defences throughout Scotland, with the odd sortie into the North of England. It was just after this date that the founder died and the Company was being managed by the second generation of Cuthberts, namely Mr. Stewart, Mr. William and Mr. Norman.

Under the guidance of this younger team much modernisation took place, which showed dividends in that many important contracts were won with the North of Scotland Hydro Electric Board, The Air Ministry

and local Authorities.

The first grandson of the Founder, and his namesake, joined the Board in 1961, followed in 1963 by the death of the Managing Director, Mr. Stewart.

In 1965 the Company ceased to be privately owned and became a member of the Derbyshire Stone Group, followed by a merger with Tarmac in 1968, to become a member of the £100 million Tarmac Derby Group.

THE KINGS CUP FORMULA FORD CHAMPIONSHIP

Won by Tom Walkinshaw in the 1969 racing season at Ingliston (with Gerry Birrell, European Champion, the runner-up), the Kings Cup Formula Ford Championship promises to be one of the exciting features in 1970. Sponsored by Kings & Co. Ltd., the Championship covers all Formula Ford races at Ingliston this year and offers, as well as the handsome Kings Cup, prize money totalling £200. For those who wish to compile their own progress table during the season, points are awarded to the best placed F.F. cars running in these races on the basis: Highest-placed F.F. car—9 points; 2nd—6 points; 3rd—4 points; 4th—3 points; 5th—2 points; and 6th—1 point. The best four scores will be counted for each competitor—should this result in a tie, the final result will be determined by reference to the highest number of highest placings. Lazier members of the public can follow the progress of the Championship through the Ingliston programmes for each meeting, which will give full details.

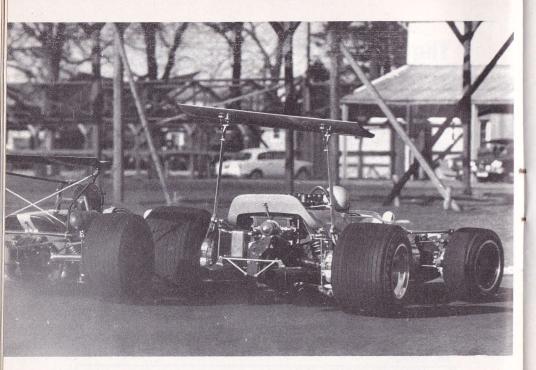

THE CALLANDS TROPHY

This beautiful solid silver quaich was presented by Major Edward G. Thomson along with very generous prize money to be won by the Formula Libre champion of Ingliston. Competitors can enter all six eligible events but only their four best scores count towards the championship.

Major Thomson is a great motor racing enthusiast and has done a great deal for this sport in Scotland and for Scotlish drivers. He has a very fine private collection of interesting cars, including the 1938 Mille Miglia-wining 2.9 litre Alfa Romeo, a type 50 Buggatti and many others such as Rolls-Royces and Bentleys.

He was a director, then Chairman and now President of Ben Line, who operate fast cargo liners between U.K. ports and the Far East. After the war the Ben Line had only six vessels left and Major Thomson had considerable courage in introducing these fast cargo liners which were built in Scotland. Shipping giants such as P. & O. and Blue Funnel have since had to catch up their lead.

for Modified Sports Cars 1970

Established in 1923 by the original Messrs H. & G. Robinson, the Company has held many famous franchises such as Lea Francis, Delage, Packard, Seabrooks, Aston Martin-Lagonda, Triumph, Vauxhall, Standard, and Jowett, and, in the pre-war days, many of the replacement parts for these hand-built vehicles were actualy made at the garage and complete custom coachwork conversions were carried out to individual requirements.

As these marques either made a dignified exit from a market that was becoming increasingly favourable to the low-priced mass-produced vehicle or became parts by name only of large Groups dedicated to satisfying these new demands, a new franchise was sought after providing an original product in which H. & G.'s might participate to a much greater extent than beforehand possible. In 1953, such a one was discovered by the name of the Volkswagenwerk AG who were then commencing the importing of a revolutionary new car in shape and concept—the now well-known VW 'Beetle'. After a very slow start, this marque was eventually established and, through the pioneering work of the then small number of VW Distributors, the franchise has now attained a very eminent position in the imported car market and ranks highest in imported car sales in this ccuntry.

However, the policy of this Company continues to be one of establishing new, advanced, totally original franchises, and one that, in our opinion, entirely fits this description is the product of the Car Division of Japanese genius Sochiro Honda's family concern.

Honda Motors first step into the motor vehicle market in this country was made with the thoroughbred S.800 sports cars using totally original parts and, therefore, qualifying as a real Sports Car. The power unit is the ultimate in reciprocating engine design, and a competition job gives the same power per litre as an average Formula One engine. Looking to the future, this car should have great value as a collector's piece, and is a very sound investment with a pure pedigree. You will see the amazing performance of the S.800 engine in the Coupe Modified Sports Car and the specially designed single-seater where the engine will be screaming round Ingliston at up to 13,000 rpm.

Both the S.800 and N.600 saloon cars are now being imported into Scotland at the Grangemouth docks, distributed by H. & G. Robinson to the Northern part of the U.K., and this should provide a very good service to the often neglected Scotland and the North of England area. The latter model, considering that it must be delivered over 12,000 miles from the factory, is available at a very reasonable price, and is a very good performer in standard trim, as an increasing number of happy people are discovering, but with very good fuel economy. We hope to have a racing version competing at Ingliston today and to demonstrate that it is as superior in its class on the track as on the road.

Later in the year, the amazing new Honda 1.3 saloon car will be arriving in this country. This car produces 100 bhp with a single carburettor at a modest 7,200 rpm, maintains a top speed of 110 mph, with four adults and luggage, and will be available at an extremely competitive price; four-carburettor versions will produce 115 bhp. The car and engine are ideal for motor racing, and the 1971 season should see Group 2 saloons, Group 4 G.T. cars, Group 5 sports cars, and 1971 Formula 3 single-seaters all employing one or the other. We hope in the near future that there may be a demonstration of the Honda 1.3 at Ingliston and that many here today will return at that time to attend this event.

We are expecting a close and exciting season in the Modsports car class, and look forward to presenting the H. & G. Robinson Trophy to the worthy winner at the end of the year.

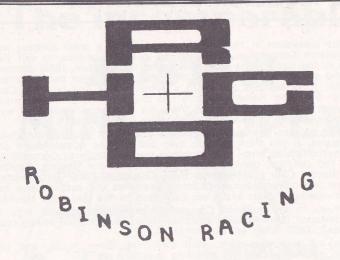
DANGER AHEAD

For those who feel in need of some refreshment during the day, D. S. Crawford Ltd., provide a comprehensive service. For Club Members a first-class three-course luncheon may be enjoyed in the MacRobert Pavilion for 11/6. Other members of the public can obtain lunch and high tea in the Herdsman's Restaurant (situated to the north of the main Grandstand), where a specimen menu may consist of: Soup or fruit juice 1/3, Braised Steak 6/-, Veal and Ham Pie with chips 5/3. Fresh Gammon or Ham with salad 6/6, Haddock and Chips (high teas only) 5/3; Apple Tart and fresh cream 1/6, Fruit Salad with fresh cream 2/6.

Hot drinks, pies and bridies and roll sandwiches are available at the Snack Bars situated in the Herdsman's Restaurant on the ground floor of the MacRobert Pavilion, in the East Gate Yard and in the area between Caravan and Southstand Corners. For "pinta people" the Scottish Milk Marketing Board sell milk drinks in the Milk Bar at the east end of the Grandstand. Cigarettes are on sale from the Players Kiosk situated behind the main Grandstand.

After the close of racing, Club Members may obtain dinner in the MacRobert Pavilion. The Club also has a licensed Bar open from 12.30 to 2.30 and 6.30 to 9.30. This is often a good opportunity for the drivers to meet together socially after the racing to air their views, and members are always welcome.

* * *

Many members of the general public may not be aware that it is possible for them to come to Ingliston in the morning on race days to watch the competitors practising. For the drivers, the ten or more laps practice session for each event is useful in making quite sure the car is handling just right, in getting the feel of a new car or, in the case of newcomers to Ingliston, in familiarising themselves with the circuit. Each car is also timed during practice, since it is these lap times which determine what the drivers' grid positions are to be in the race itself. What this means, of course, is that the competitors are really trying their hardest to clock a fast lap time, thus ensuring a favourable place on the starting grid. The morning is accordingly never dull-indeed, since there is always a small drop-out of competitors between practice and the race itself, it is often the case that some of the most exciting action occurs in the morning. The spectator in the morning will certainly see many more of the original entrants and their vehicles than will the person who arrives at two o'clock. The early bird will also be able to assess each competitor's form and to make up his own mind as to their chances in the afternoon's sport.

What does all this extra entertainment cost? Absolutely nothing. The charge for admission to the Showground, etc., is exactly the same whether you spend eight hours watching the racing or eight minutes! Between the end of practice and the beginning of the afternoon's programme a variety of lunches can be obtained, ranging from a mug of soup and a hot pie to a delicious three-course Juncheon. Club members may also retire to the bar in the MacRobert Pavilion between 12.30 and 2.30 and, over the soothing influence of the brew of their choice, join in the speculation as to the afternoon's racing.

In short, why not make a day of it and come along in the morning. It costs you no more and gives double the entertainment value. We're ready at nine when the gates open—are you?

You may be surprised to know that something like 500 voluntary officials are required to run a race meeting at Ingliston. Without their assistance there just would not be any racing and we would ask you to co-operate with them so as to ensure the enjoyment of every person, whether they be spectator, competitor or official. Your safety depends on them and we do ask you not to jeopardise their's or others' by disregarding their instruction.

* * *

Quite a lot of activity happens throughout the day and some of this may seem strange to the newcomer. All motor sport in Britain is strictly controlled by the Motor Sport Division of the R.A.C. and the controls are aimed at making the sport just as safe as is possible. Responsible for making sure that the meeting runs to schedule and runs according to the regulations is the Clerk of the Course, who you will see driving round the circuit between races in a car carrying a white flag, checking that everything is in order for the next event. His "nerve-centre" is the Race Control Building in the Central Enclosure (the rather splendid glass box below the clock-mast), where he keeps in touch by telephone throughout the day with all the points around the circuit. The track is divided into sectors, each under the control of an Observer, and each equipped with a telephone. The Observer has with him a number of different marshals; some of these are responsible for keeping the track clear for racing and for undertaking rescue operations in the event of an accident, others for signalling to drivers by means of recognised flags to warn them of dangers or let them know that a car behind wishes to overtake.

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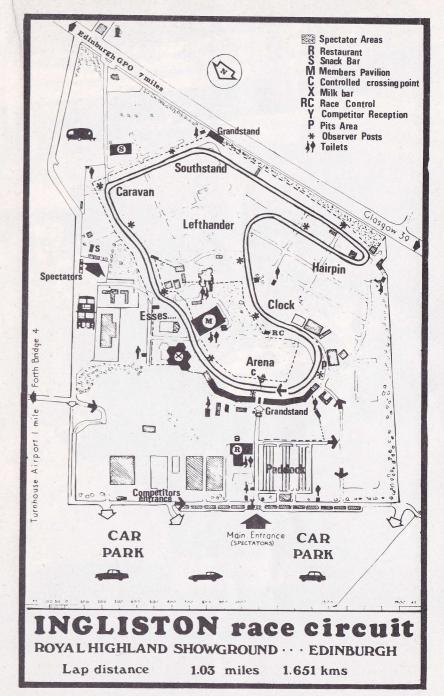
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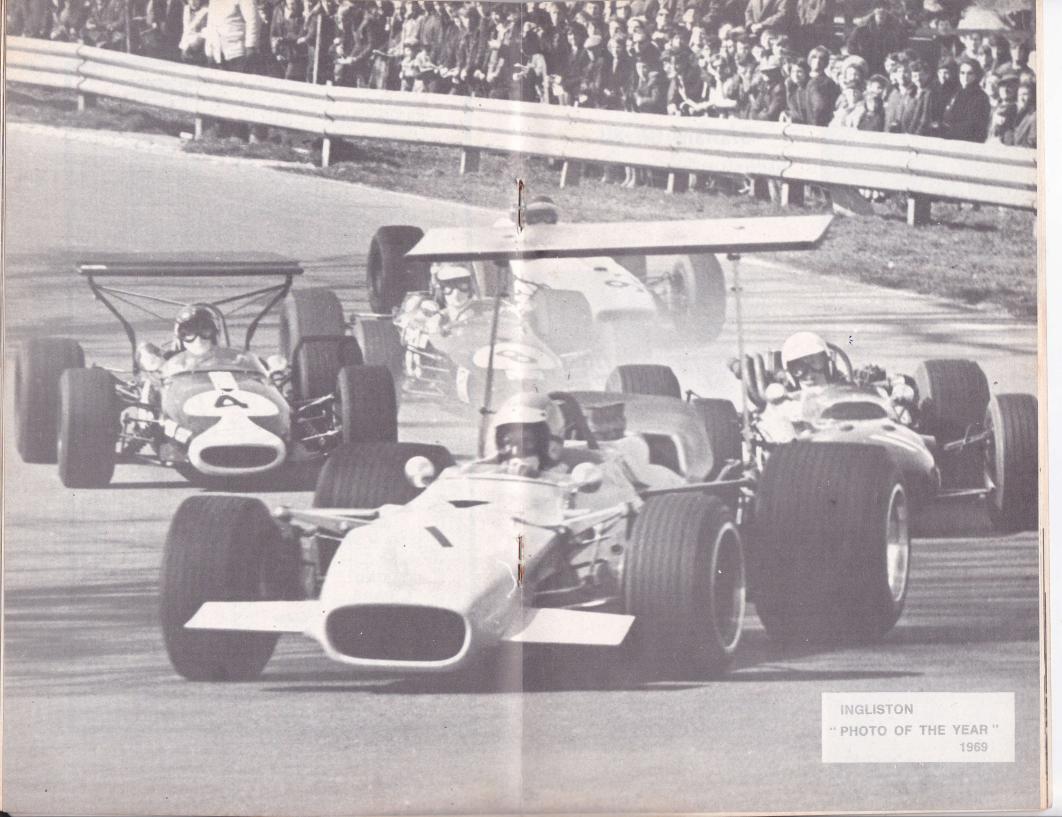

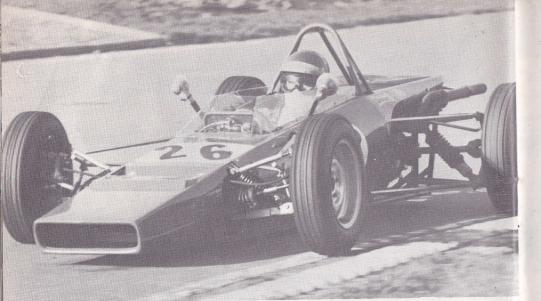

EVENT 2

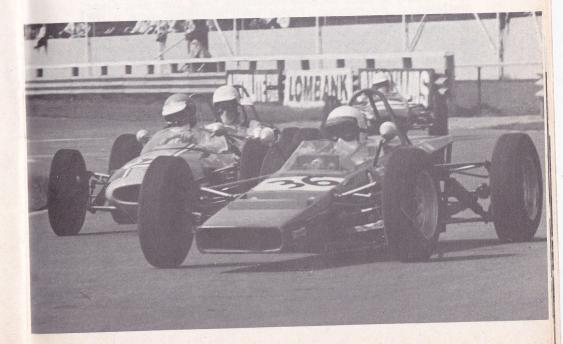

A one-time Ingliston regular who was unable to make it to Ingliston in '69 was Harry Gilbert, who today makes a welcome return in a Hawke DL2A, the breed which carried Tom Walkinshaw to victory in the 1969 Formula Ford Championship. A welcome back, too to the "lower than a snake's belly" Mallock, as also to the ex-Phil Weed Alexis fielded this year by Terry Horrocks. New marques to make their appearance at Ingliston today are the Dulon and Barracuda Formula Fords. The former is being driven by Edinburgh Insurance Agent Donald Macleod. The Barracuda on the other hand appears to be new to everyone, including its driver, Dave Sunter. Powered by a Steele Ford engine, it will have to compete with the other similarly powered car today, Bernard Hunter's Merlyn. Bernie was third in the Kings Cup Championship last year with this car and he has always been a hard man to beat. Trying to do just that, however, will be the other regular Ingliston driver, Brian Squires.

"1970, the year of the saloons." That's what we hope it will be but you can never tell. Today's entry certainly looks that way, however, with a terrifying (well, that's the way we would be feeling if we were on the grid with that lot behind us) field of heavy machinery. Favourite must be 1969 Saloon Champion Graham Birrell with the new Wylie's Escort but, strangely enough, Graham's car is not so powerful as that of his wife Jenny. With both Escorts revving away like fury in the backyard nobody could say that there's "nae din" in that house. (Apologies for the puny pun—the Editor was not going to print it until he discovered he wrote it himself.)

Graham's 1969 Championship-winning car is also present this afternoon with Borderer Dougy Niven at the wheel. Dougy was seen occasionally last year in a much outclassed Anglia but nevertheless managed to clock up some respectable times. With more potent machinery at his fingertips. Dougal could well upset quite a few people this year. Another man who has changed a rather slower car for something better this year is lan McLaren, who is driving another ex-Birrell car, the ex-Gerry Birrell Singer Chamois. With its Coventry Climax engine rebuilt and tweaked by the Climax wizard, Hugh Shannon, this car could again be amongst the leaders.

Car of the day, however, may well be Jimmy Veitch's Vauxhall Veeva. This is the ex-Alan Brodie monster car, completely rebuilt and redesigned by Jimmy and carrying an 8-cylinder Chevrolet engine. With more than enough power at his finger tips, Jimmy may well be able to turn the table on Graham this year. It'll certainly be a difficult car to beat, since its rear wheels are reputed to be even wider than those on Willie Forbes' Loia.

One interesting feature today is the duo of Anglia Twin Cams, both Aberdeen rally driver Maitland Miller and Largs garage owner Max Brown taking to the field today in these. The Anglia Lotus combination has not been seen at Ingliston before and spectators will doubtless be keen to see whether they can rival their Escort rivals. Against the Anglias will be the usual gaggle of big Minis, led by Bill Borrowman, this time in Brian Gruber's 1300 Cooper 'S'.

Just as in Event 1, only the fastest 15 of the 29 entries will be seen on the grid this afternoon. The other 14 will have been weeded out in practice, leaving only the most competitive cars for your entertainment.

The only change to that group today is the substitution of Nigel Morrison (the 1969 Ingliston G.T. Champion) for Bill Dryden in the H. & G. Robinson stable. Miles Hopperton returns in 1970 to defend his lap record with the M.G. Midget against Andrew Hutchison, who will be trying to raise his class lap record to an outright one. The question mark of the day will be how well Nigel Morrison will be taking to the diminutive Honda after the power of his Chevron G.T. If all goes according to the plans of H. & G. Robinson Racing, however, then the Trophy will never have to leave Gosforth at the end of the season.

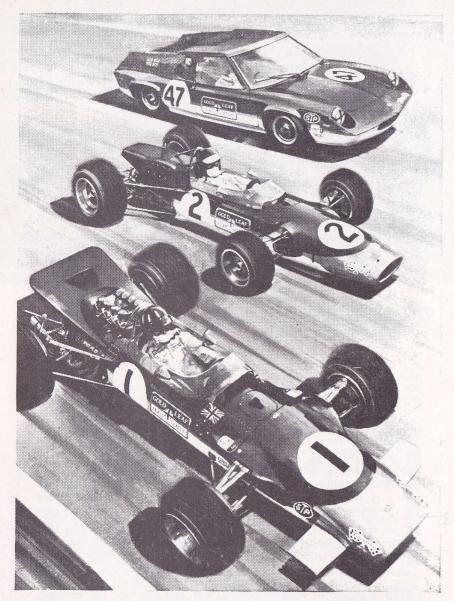
The two men that the favourites will have to watch, however, are Chief Constable John Gott and John Milne. Once again its Spring lecture time at Tulliallan Police Cadet College and, curiously enough, the date just so happens to coincide with the April race meeting (guess who arranged that!). As a direct indirect result of all this shilly-shallying the long arm (no, John, we shan't say tooth) of the Law makes an always welcome return with his now legendary Austin Healey 3000. In this car John was runner-up of the Amasco Prodsports Championship last year and won this Championship in (if one is to believe John's entry form) 1698 (you can see why the car is legendary!). John will be going all out to recapture the class lap record which Andrew Hutchison took from him last season.

One of the ex-drivers of John's Healey is Bill Shepherd, the entrant of John Milne's Midget. John was Scottish Speed Champion in 1966 and today gives the Midget its first outing. This car should be well worth watching since John and Bill have taken advantage of the new R.A.C. "Modsport" rules by supercharging it. Definitely a man to watch in 1970.

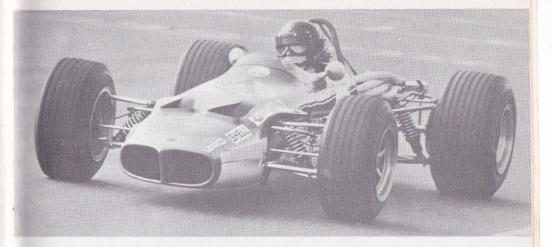

Again a rather disappointing entry on the G.T. front. Like last year, there just does not seem to be enough money around to afford these expensive animals and the circuits must accordingly suffer. What there is, however, does promise some interesting racing. Back again are the Mercury G.T. and Fisher G.T. which battled neck and neck throughout the latter half of 1969 and we can look forward to a resumption of that duel. Eddie Labinjoh is again driving the Fisher, the car with which he holds the class lap record, and if anyone deserves to pull off the Sheila Whyte Championship this year, he does. (Which is one way of twisting his arm to race at all six Meetings!) Powered by its Mini Cooper 'S' engine, the Fisher will again be challenging the ex-Buller Sinfield/George Silverwood Mercury for the chequered flag. The Mercury has been acquired by G. McWilliam of Glasgow and his performance with the car should be interesting since he is a newcomer to the circuit.

Equipe Centro Scot, the Falkirk-based Mafia of motor racing, having sold their Crossle to Campbell Graham, have transferred the proceeds and some into a Chevron BMW. By foul means or fair they have also transferred Logan Morrison from the wee saloon class to the pilot's seat in the G.T. and hope to have as much success (if not more) with the combination in this class as they had with Gerry Birrell and the Crossle last year in Formula Ford. The result of all this changing around will certainly be entertaining, if not (as we suspect) downright successful and Eddie Labinjoh is going to have to work himself up into a lather to earn the Championship this year.

Also with a Chevron, but with a difference, is Geoff Temple. Geoff, who developed a liking for the Ingliston circuit last year, brings back his Chevron B1 Clubman, the original Chevron prototype. Let us hope that a few more of his Clubman brethren follow his example by venturing North of the Tweed. Although somewhat outclassed by the heavier machinery, Geoff is bound to be "having a go" and, when you remember that he was the joint winner of the Leedspeed Trophy last year, that can't be that slow!

Since the entry is so poor, some of the more competitive Modsports are being invited to participate as "up to 1150 cc G.T.s." The commentator will fill you in on these so that you may enter them in the blank spaces.

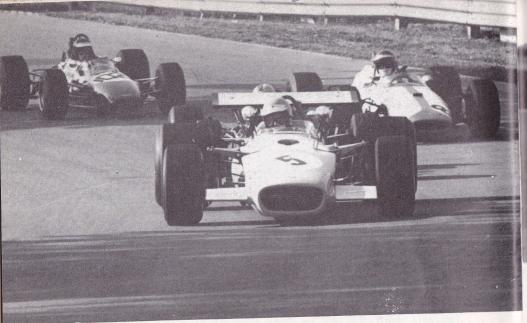

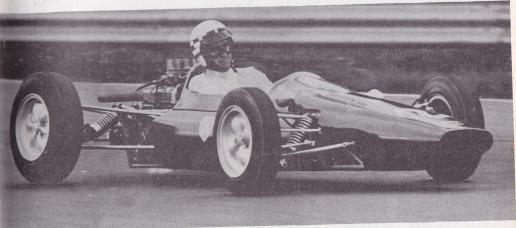


EVENT 6

Another first round in the annual battle for the fabulous Callands Trophy opens today with one of the most potentially exicting situations ever. Exactly one year ago today the circuit thrilled to possibly the best race ever seen at Ingliston, the incredibly close dice between the Lola T142 of Willie Forbes and the Ecurie Ecosse Brabham BT 23C driven by Graham Birrell. On that occasion it was Willie Forbes who just managed to take the chequered flag, setting in the process a new outright lap record of 74.46 miles per hour, a record which still stands. The two cars did not meet again throughout 1969 at Ingliston and many spectators have wondered whether it might not perhaps have been the Brabham's turn to wear the ladrel wreath had they in fact done so. In short, they are still arguing just as much today as they did a year ago as to which car is the fastest round the Ingliston circuit.

Today may see an answer to that question. Having been unable to sell his Lola over the winter, Willie is back once again with the big car for another crack at the Callands Trophy. Appearing against him, for the first time since last April, is the ex-Jochen Rindt Brabham BT 23C of Ecurie Ecosse. Graham Birrell was scheduled to drive the team's newly-ordered Brabham BT30 at Hockenheim today but this will not be ready in time and everyone is accordingly looking forward to seeing Graham once again in the seat of the 23C. We should therefore see a resumption of the tremendous tussle that Graham and Willie had in April, 1969. Just to stick our necks out, we might be tempted to put our money on Graham—since the beginning of last year he has had a considerable schooling in this car in some pretty tough International Formula 2 events and this must inevitably improve his driving. Willie, on the other hand, is a wily old fox and he will be looking for a Callands hat-trick this year. In short, anything could happen.

While Willie and Graham are battling things out in the heavy league we can expect some pretty exciting things to be happening amongst the smaller capacity cars. Dick Scott, the erstwhile Aberdonian who is now a member of the Paul Watson Race Organisation, is back at the circuit with a split new Brabham BT28/Lucas Formula 3 and, in this car, he could well upset a lot of apple carts. Indeed, in October last year, he beat Willie Forbes into third place in the main race, set-



ting up a new class lap record in the process. In 1969 he scored six F3 wins, was second in the Munich International Race, and won the Ron Flockhart Memorial Trophy for being Scotland's most promising driver that year. His formula 3 rival this afternoon could well be reigning Ingliston Formula Ford Champion Tom Walkinshaw, who is fielding a split new Lotus 59. We have often felt that the Ingliston circuit is ideally suited for Formula 3 cars and this afternoon, with two really competitive examples racing, could well prove us right.

Dark horse of the day must surely be the H. & G. Robinson Costin Walker Honda. This car was entered last season but late delivery caused its non-appearance. The Honda is now ready for racing and H. & G. expect to be doing some deft carburettor changing between the Formula Ford and Formula Libre events. With 1969 G.T. Champion Nigel Morrison at the wheel, the Costin Walker Honda could surprise quite a lot of people (including, perhaps, H. & G. Robinson Racing). Another car of interest is the return, after a long absence, of the





Ecosse Imp. Raced two seasons ago at Ingliston by Ecurie Ecosse, this diminutive Imp powered racer was immensely successful in its class. It now returns, tweaked and re-tweaked, in the hands of Murray McGrath, a newcomer to circuit racing.

Hugh Shannon must be working late at nights! Every other engine you come across seems to have his magic touch nowadays (the other half are probably breathed on by Brian Hart!) and Ronnie Mackay's Brabham is no exception. Ronnie, a garage manager from Thurso, is still possibly (and regretably) one of the most under-rated drivers at Ingliston and, given half a chance, he could easily be out there in front. Certainly, if you're looking for a Sunday afternoon driver, Ronnie is NOT your man. Back again to the single-seaters is Eddie Labinjoh with the ill-fated Fisher Alfá. This car encountered severe teething troubles last season, which were not improved by a seeming reticence on the part of Alfa Romeo to return their engine to them. All is now well again and the pundits will be watching very closely to see how well the fuel-injected Fisher/Alfa goes—if Jack Fisher's work on the Fisher G.T. is anything to go by, we can certainly look forward to seeing an immaculately turned out and exceedingly fast car.

Kicking himself right now is John Millar from Bridge of Weir. John forgot to drain the water off before the winter and, when the ice thawed, so did his block! While he hopes to have everything glued together again by this afternoon, he holds out no promises so don't be disappointed if this popular competitor is unable to race.

If the grid falls too low through withdrawals or otherwise, arrangements have been made to bring some of the faster Formula Fords into the fray, classing them as under 1000 cc cars. If spectators can remember the terrific drives that Gerry Birrell used to put up (coming third overall on one occasion) in these circumstances with his Crossle Formula Ford last year, you will understand just how interesting this can be.

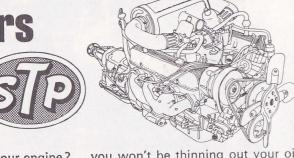

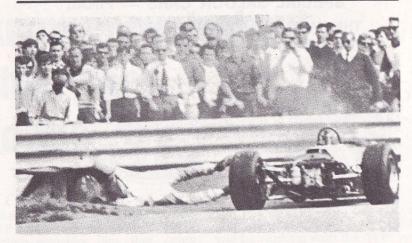

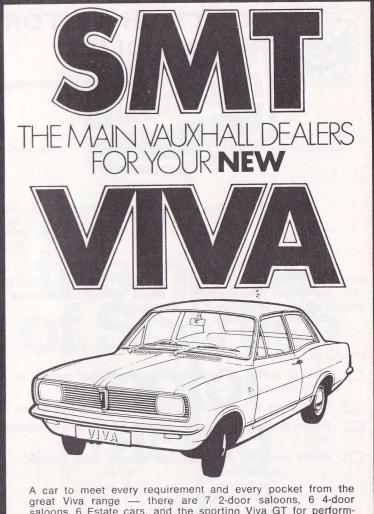
Last season we ran a series on the jobs carried out by the marshalls and other officials at the Ingliston circuit. With only six meetings to play with, it was soon apparent that we could not possibly hope to cover every single activity behind the scenes. Consequently, and with no apologies to those of you who know it all, the series is continued this year, beginning with the silver-suited gents who hope that they will never be called upon to hot foot it to the centre of an Ingliston inferno. In short

THE HOT SEATERS

A group of people who are not racing enthusiasts but who have a very important job to do are the silver-suited firemen around the track who came on the scene two seasons ago as part of developemnts made in motor racing safety. For them a race meeting at Ingliston is usually trouble-free but they have been trained to act in an emergency and literally walk into the flames of a burning car and rescue the driver. These firemen, who come from Turnhouse Airport, are helpers here at Ingliston whom we hope will never have to turn a hand in work so long as racing takes place. Nobody likes accidents and certainly not accidents involving fire, but the firemen dotted around the track in their stuffy, warm silver suits are trained to do the job. When the club first considered the use of fire-fighting suits it was thought that marshalls should use them but it was decided that it would be better to have professional fire-fighters in the team, hence the decision to have the Turnhouse firemen.

Then there are the first-aid teams who are often quite busy at Ingliston, though usually in tending to children who have fainted in the heat or twisted ankles caused by tripping. Occasionally a driver is taken for a check-up after a crash. Long may this state of affairs continue for, though Ingliston has seen its share of accidents, few have been of a serious nature and for this we must be thankful to the thoughtful planning of the promoters and to those who have a job of work to do and rarely have time to see the racing.

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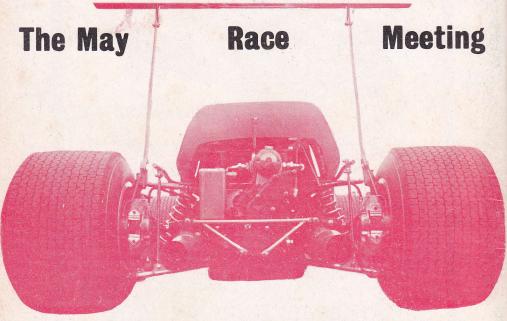
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
