For your Day's Enjoyment ...

At Ingliston today for their last chance to race on the three-quartermile circuit are well over 100 competitors with most of the "regulars" back for a last fling. So far this year Aberdonian Willie Forbes and his Lotus-BMW have dominated the Formula Libre "Callands Trophy" Championship races at Ingliston, with two wins and a second place putting him in an almost invincible position. At present lying in second place in the Championship is fellow-Aberdonian Richard Scott-also Lotus-mounted but with a smaller-engined F3 Type 41-who finished second in the Edinburgh Students' Charities Cup Race and 5th in the SMT Trophy Race. To retain his title, last year's Champion, Andrew Fletcher from Alva in Clackmannanshire with his faithful BT18 Brabham would need to win the three remaining races and ensure that Forbes finished no higher than 5th in any of them. Fletcher's car has been plagued with an unreliable engine this year in marked contrast to 1967 when his car, with slightly less power, was outstandingly troublefree. Tony Charnell has sold his Singer Chamois to concentrate on running his Formula-Libre Type 55 Lola and with a third place at the Students' Meeting could on paper still be well-placed if he can find a little more steam. Bill Dryden has been plagued with clutch trouble this season but there is little doubt that his car is very fast and a potential race-winner so long as he can change gear. This Brabham is the car that Mike Walker raced last year before his unfortunate accident at Crystal Palace. John Millar is another Brabham-mounted driver whom luck has eluded this year, for after waiting all winter for delivery of a new car from Brabhams, he finally purchased a secondhand BMW-engined model which has not proved very reliable. This young driver from Bridge-of-Weir needs a break at this meeting to restore confidence. A feature of Ingliston is the number of good single-seater entries which can be mustered — this is something almost alien to other British circuits-and a newcomer this year who shows no little promise is Ronnie MacKay, nephew of Jimmy MacKay whose exploits in a Lotus XI from Thurso used to thrill the crowds at Charterhall and elsewhere even before Ingliston. Ronnie, who also comes from that far outpost on the North coast of Scotland, bought John Millar's Brabham F3 car during the winter and has been well up among the smaller-engined single-seaters this year. Now that David Murray has left Merchiston Motors, Ecurie Ecosse is in a transitory state and the two cars have been lent to the brothers Graham and Gerry Birrell to enter and run. The little Ecosse-Imps are very quick and seem to be much less fragile than last year when dogged by suspension failures. Graham has been mixing it with the best of the smaller cars this year and Gerry, who drove the car last year, should back him up well.

So much for the "home" drivers, but what of the visitors this meeting? Headed by **Dave Berry** who has been up with Frank Lythqoe's cars for each meeting and intends to pay us a visit at the remaining three, and who is probably the only visitor with a chance of winning the Championship, we have **Howard Heerey** with his quick F3 Chevron and a newcomer in the form of **Mike Butcher** in the Haggispeed-Ford. This interesting car, based on an ex-works F2 Cooper, is entered by Richard le Sueur whose uncle, Tom Legget, was until last year Clerk of Course at Ingliston, and who is bringing the car all the way from Bournemouth on the South coast of England. We have a single-seater visitor from over the Irish sea, with **Brian Cullen** bringing his Type 60 Lola from Limerick. Finally, **Robin Darlington**, a Welsh farmer, who is a potential winner with his Brabham BT21A twin-cam.

far this season and these are John Nicholson and George Silverwood. Both drive G.T. versions of the Lotus 23, that fantastically successful sports car with which the late Jim Clark took the might of Ferrari by surprise in 1962. Nicholson's Jaynick is based in Glasgow and the body was built last year based on the Mercury, which Silverwood drives. The Javnick, however, has a 1600cc twin-cam Lotus engine whereas the Mercury has an 1100cc Ford engine and both are in fact competing in different classes with the same race. In the dry, Nigel Morrison should provide very stiff opposition to these twi in his new Chevron BMW a sister-car of the one with which John Lepp won the race in July, Nigel and Andrew Fletcher returned last week-end from a very fine performance at the fantastic Mugello Circuit in Italy with its 40-mile lap; that they came home 2nd in Group 4 Category and first British car to finish speaks highly of both and drivers. Eddie Labinjoh returns again with the Edinburgh-built Fisher G.T. and John Alexander with the Mini-Marcos entered by McCrae & Drew.

Some alterations to the Marque car regulations have been made since the last race for this class. The Scottish Motor Racing Club feel there should be one class in which the average competitor who is unable to afford a separate car for competition purposes can still have a race, and to this end it is now a condition that entrants in the Marque class shall have driven their car to the circuit and that the car shall comply with Ministry of Transport regulations and be licensed. At the last meeting Andrew Cowan proved conclusively that it was possible to win a race in such conditions by taking the chequered flag in a borrowed Lotus Elan Plus 2-this model's competition debutand this car has been entered again. That it is a genuine road car can be gauged from the fact that it has done 23,000 miles in the past eight months in the hands of its owner, Ian Scott Watson! Another who has been well-placed this year in a car used regularly on the road is George Taylor in the diminutive Honda and the same may also be said about John Hall's MG Midget and Tom Thomson's E-Type Jaguar. With four newcomers in this class it looks as if the club's policy should pay off.

Formula Ford has really caught the competitor's attention at Ingliston and—as distinct from the Formula Vee races—the difficulty has been in fitting everyone in rather than in making up races. Leading in the Kings Cup Championship to date are Harry Gilbert and Brian Squires, hoteliers respectively from Aberdeen and Ardlui by Loch Lomond, and both mounted on Lotus 51 cars. They won't find things quite so easy for the remainder of the season, for Gerry Birrell proved that he has the Centro-Scott FF fully sorted now (it is based on a 1961 Lotus 20 Formula Junior car belonging to Tony Evengelisti and friends from Falkirk) at the last meeting and John MacDonald, who brought his Russell-Alexis from Suffolk to finish 3rd in July is back again. Bernard Hunter and Ted Clark are two other Lotus-mounted drivers worth watching in this race and who hail respectively from Leith and North Berwick However, potentially faster than them all must be Richard Mallock in the fantastic Mallock U2 built by his father, Arthur of the same ilk. The Mallocks, pere-et-fils, hail from Road in Northamptonshire and look like successfully breaking into Formula Ford to repeat the success they have had in Clubman's racing.

Saloons, saloons, saloons and plenty of them. Most spectators find the Minis and Imps and Anglias the best entertainment of the

day at Ingliston. They shouldn't be disappointed this meeting with three full fields in all of which they will be fighting for a place in the Hartley Whyte race at the end of the programme-and usually by far the best race of the day for those who stay to the end. In the largerengined class the battle should be led by a foursome comprising brothers Gerry and Graham Birrell, respectively mounted on Claud Hamilton Motors' Shannon-Chamois and Wylies' Ford Perdal Escort. Last meeting saw an unfortunate start-line incident when Gerry, from the second row of the grid, made a beautiful start and almost managed to get through a front-line gap between brother Graham's Escort and John Handley's Mini-Cooper. Both the front-liners realised fractionally too late what was happening and closed the gap, bringing all three cars into contact, just as the Escort lost adhesion on the grass on the edge of the track and shot off into the barrier. Handley and Birrell Junior continued to have a monumental race until the former nudged the latter at Shepherds and both spun off. Poor Handley-one of Britain's leading Mini exponents-was unable to continue and it says a lot for his entrant Don Moore that he is back for more at this meeting. Don said at the last meeting that he thoroughly enjoyed his first visit to Inglistan and looked forward to his return-but that was before the above incident! The fourth of the potential winners in this class is Jim Dryden whose Mini-Cooper must be the fastest in Scotland at the moment. This Dundee driver with his Downton-tuned car won the Hartley Whyte race in April, but blew it up in May and failed to start in July. He'll be out to make amends today. Bill Borrowman is hoping to have the larger-engined Moir & Baxter/Sportstune Mini somewhat faster by now and to make (Orange) Box 2 as quick as Box 1, with which he won the Hartley Whyte race in July. Davey Muter is another Mini-pilot who doesn't hang around and two newcomers this year have been Andy Barrett and Denis Kerr who finished 2nd and 3rd in May after everyone else dropped out with mechanical trouble!



Among the smaller-engined cars, Logan Morrison has been consistently the best this year with his ex-Alan Fraser Singer Chamois. Logan, who is a Singer agent from Bridge-of-Allan (no, I don't mean he is a Pop-Star King!) used to be very well-known as a works rallydriver, latterly for Rovers before they withdrew. Andy Barton with his blue-striped white Mini-Cooper, is always quick and really tries to give of his best supported by a huge following of "Geordies" from Newcastle. This meeting his famous old Morris Minor will be back again in the hands of his foreman mechanic Harry Vickers. Unlucky so far by becoming involved in other people's accidents this year has been the Imp entered jointly by George Douglas and David Stewart from Perth, the latter driving on this occasion and Bob Haining will be endeavouring to make his similar car go quicker. Eric Howden, now the proud owner of Tony Charnell's Chamois, will be determined to make his mark in this class over the next few meetings and among the potentially-slower small saloons entered in Event 1 it is nice to see Andrew Bonar back despite having moved to Leicester from Glasgow during the winter. His A40 should have a good race with John Ritchie's similar car and Clive Reeves is another potential winner of this race, along with Alec Ormiston.



All-in-all, this last meeting on the present circuit looks like being a really good swan-song and we all look forward to a few new records being set-up during the day. One thing is certain—these won't be beaten on the new circuit.

Why the King Hussein Trophy Race? Some of those who had not yet been introduced to motor racing at Ingliston during 1966 may raise their eyes to see a Royal trophy. His Jordanian Majesty's interest in cars is probably well-known to most and when King Hussein oaid Scotland a State Visit in 1966 it coincided with one of our meetings. The King and Princess Muna honoured us with a visit and to commemorate such a memorable event presented the perpetual challenge trophy to the club for which today's main race is being run. Previous winners have been **Peter Gethin** (Frank Lythgoe/Brabham) and **Chris Williams** (Red Rose Motors/Brabham).



During the lunch break the Sound of Music will be evident and to provide it is the Band of the Royal Marines (The Flag Officer Scotland and Nothern Ireland) who will be marching to and fro in front of the Main Grandstand and—weather permitting—may be persuaded to make one lap of the Circuit.

This band is one of 21 Royal Marine Bands whose primary task is to promote music for the Royal Navy.

32 strong, the band is commanded by Band Master F. Matthias, Royal Marines, and is held in charge by Band Sergeant K. Morrison.

Most of the musicians play two or more instruments and can when the occasion arises be called upon to play a 25 piece light orchestra cord, or a 16 piece dance band quite apart from the military marching and concert bands.

Stationed at H.M. Soondar, the Royal Naval Air Station at Arbroath, in Angus, they are controlled by the Flag Officer Scotland and Northern Ireland whose air and command covers the north of England, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

When the band is not required for service engagement outside the Air Station they are employed as an integral part of the training programme of the establishment for official parties, guards of honour etc.

The band has recently completed an extensive tour of Northern Ireland, Scotland and Northern England, and represented the Royal Navy at the Royal Revue at Holyrood.



If you are a newcomer to Ingliston, you should first look at the map on page 18. Doubtless you will feel in need of some refreshment during the day, and there are snack bars in the Herdsman's Restaurant to the North of the main grandstand, on the ground floor of the MacRobert Pavilion in the Central Enclosure, in the East Gate Courtyard and in the area between Gardeners' and Shepherds' Corners. Here you can find snacks served throughout the day but if you wish a full meal this is available to the general public in the Herdsman's Restaurant, to officials in a hurry in the hut behind the MacRobert Pavillan, and to members of the Scottish Motor Racing Club in the beautiful MacRobert Pavilion in the central enclosure. Members should remember that the Club has also a Licensed Bar open during normal opening hours (Scottish licensing hours prohibit special licences on Sundays!) from 12.30 to 2.30 and from 6.30 to 9.30. High teas are served from 5.30 p.m, Lunches cost about 8/6 in the Herdman's and 10/- in the MacRobert. Finally, the Scottish Milk Marketing Board sell milk drinks of all types in their Milk Bar at the East end of the Grandstand.



You may be surprised to know that something like 400 voluntary officials are required to run a race meeting at Ingliston. Wtihout their

assistance there just would not be any racing and we would ask you to co-operate with them so as to ensure the enjoyment of every person, whether they be spectator, competitor or official. Your safety depends on them and we do ask you not to jeopardise theirs' or others by disregarding their instructions.



Many racegoers are enthusiastic photographers or cine-photographers and it could be that you will run out of film if it is a sunny day with the usual amount of excitement. Reg Forester-Smith will be pleased to sell you photographic goods from his shop behind the Highland Grandstand. He also takes photographs at every meeting and you may wish to purchase photographs of your favourite drivers or cars.



There is always a fascination for motor accessories and a demand for the necessities of racing — goggles, racing overalls, stopwatches, etc. These can be obtained from Graham Birrell's mobile shop just opposite the Forester-Smith shop behind the grandstand.



Quite a lot of activity happens throughout the day and some of this may seem strange to the newcomer. All motor sport in Britain is strictly controlled by the Motor Sport Division of the R.A.C. and the controls are aimed at making the sport just as safe as is possible. Responsible for making sure that the meeting runs to schedule and runs according to the regulations is the Clerk of Course, whom you will see driving round the circuit between races in a car carrying a white flag, checking that everything is in order for the next event. His "nerve-centre" is the Race Control Building in the Central Enclosure (the rather splendid glass box below the clock-mast), where he keeps in touch by telephone throughout the day with all the points around the circuit. The track is divided into sectors, each under the control of an Observer, and each equipped with a telephone The observer has with him a number of different marshals; some of these are responsible for keeping the track clear for racing and for undertaking rescue operations in the event of an accident, others for signalling to drivers by means of recognised flags to warn them of dangers or let them know that a car behind wishes to overtake. The Yellow Flag is used as a warning in the event of an incident ahead; the yellow and red striped flag indicates the presence of oil on the circuit's surface; the blue flag is used to indicate-when held stationary-the presence of a car close behind, and when waved the fact that a car is attempting to overtake. If you are in the main grandstand you may also see a black flag displayed with a number on a board; this is a signal to the car bearing that number that he must return to the pits on his next lap and it usually indicates either a fault in the car which is visible to the observers but perhaps not apparent to the driver or that the driver has committed some infringement of regulations.



You may wonder where to get grandstand seats. These are available—or at least all those which have not been sold in advance—from a klosk immediately behind the Crossing Point to the Central Enclosure in the centre of the main grandstand, with the exception of those for the Shepherds' Grandstand, which are available from a klosk in the East Gate Courtyard. Prices for all tickets are 10/-, except for those in the East Wing of the Highland Stand which are 5/-.

Programmes are available from three different kiosks. One at the Main North Gate, one behind the main grandstand and one in the East Gate Courtyard (where the Shepherds' Grandstand tickets are sold).

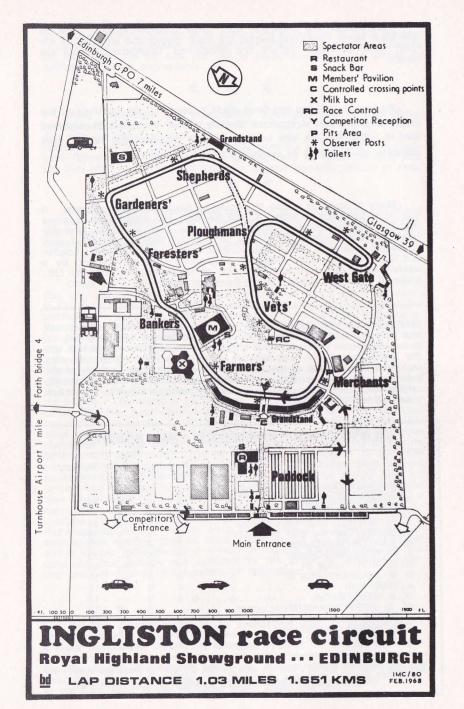

Ingliston Grows Up

Scotland gets a little nearer staging a Scottish Grand Prix with the opening on the 8th of next month of the new Ingliston extension. Whilst hardened racing enthulasts may feel that a total lap distance of just over 1 mile is not really much of a circuit the fact remains that ingliston's present mini-circuit has opened up an entirely new concept of motor racing and has been an unqualified success. On that day in April 1965 when a near-capacity crowd set the pattern that has been repeated regularly each year since, there were very few in Scotland who could be said to be regular race-goers but the fact that attendance has never dropped below 9000 during the past two seasons confirms the belief that there are now at least that number willing to brave the most atrocious of weather conditions to come to the Highland Showground to watch their heros demonstrating that peculiar brand of determined driving that has become such a feature of racing at Scotland's only circuit. While other circuits have cancelled meetings and race fields which almost completely lost on their 2 and 3- mile circuits not one meeting has passed but that there have been numerous disappointed competitors whose entries have had to be refused through lack of space at Ingliston.

It is, however, equally the case that there have on occasions been the time when races have suffered through, the near-impossibility of overtaking between Ingliston's eight bends and the new extension, provides just that opportunity to skilful drivers. Racing should thus be considerably enhanced next month and the Edinburgh Festival Meeting is one that everyone who has been initiated into motor racing in Scotland should be sure to attend.

Work is well in hand, as spectators in the Shepherds area will see, with the widening of the existing roads forming the two legs of the extension ready for surfacing and excavation work completed just as near to the circuit in use today as is practical and safe. The hairpin—which is certainly going to prove an exciting vantage point when the new spectator areas come into operation in 1969—is equally ready and waiting its surfacing. The Main Contractors are George Wimpey & Co. Ltd., but the earth-moving has been sub-contracted to Estate Road Development Co. Ltd. under the direction of Mike Hawkins—one of our Observers and a keen member of the Scottish Motor Racing Club.

HISTORIC CAR DEMONSTRATION MASERATI 250F

In 1958 it was sold to Keith Campbell who was killed in that year in a motor cycle accident.

It was re-discovered in 1956 by Patrick Lindsay and has been driven in historic car races ever since, most of which it has won.
